ANOTHER SPEECH BY CHAMBERLAIN

Discusses Great Britain's Foreign Policy.

SPEAKS OF FRANCE'S POLICY OF EXASPERATION

And Sees no Difficulties in the Way of Agreement with Russia.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, speaking at the Conservative gathering in Wakefield, Yorkshire, last evening, discussed home and foreign affairs and the Government's policy in Egypt which, he said, depended entirely upon the possibility of reaching an understanding with France, a thing which is impossible so long as the French pursue a policy of exasperation.

With regard to relations between Great Britain and Russia in connection with the East, he said that while, hitherto, endeavours to reach an agreement had failed, he believed an agreement with Russia was necessary unless very serious complications were to be encountered. There were, he continued, no unsurmountable obstacles to an agreement. On the contrary it was quite possible to conciliate the reasonable ambition of Russia with the fixed policy of Great Britain, and to maintain equal opportunity of trade for all nations.

"I am more sanguine of arriving at a settlement," said Chamberlain, "because it is not necessary for our interests alone."

THE DREYFUS CASE.

Colonel Henry Himself a Traitor.

PARIS, Dec. 8.—The Radical, with some reservation, makes the statement that as the result of the enquiries made by the Court of Cassation, it appears the traitor who sold documents containing military secrets to a foreign power was C. I. Henry, and not Dreyfus. The fact that Henry had been living beyond his means attracted attention, and investigation as to the source of the money he was sending revealed part of the truth, confirming the stories about the relations between him and Esterhazy. Henry, who was spending 30,000 francs a year, while his salary was only 10,000 francs, received money from abroad through an intermediary, who proves to have been Esterhazy. Henry seems to have made the Dreyfus dossier from all sorts of documents as soon as the leakage was discovered. Thus it came that Esterhazy wrote the bordereau at Henry's dictation.

A BIG MAN

Sensation in a French Theatre.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The Paris correspondent of the Mail wires that M. Constantin, a young Frenchman of nineteen, who has just been introduced at the Folies Bergere, is eight feet tall, and probably bigger than any other man who has ever lived. He is perfectly proportioned. He arrived in a huge railway wagon, into which he had the greatest difficulty in stowing himself.

His arrival at the theatre produced a queer effect. The ballet girls crowded around at the wings to see their new comrade, and his appearance was the signal for a general cry of "Sauve qui peut" (All save themselves who can), amid stifled screams of "Dieu? quo j'ai peur?" (Lord? but I'm scared?) The audience were intensely excited at the new giant's appearance. His stroll around the house was greeted with little shrieks of fear and roars of applause. Stairs are the young man's chief difficulty, for his knees are rather weak, and his feet—although each is over 32 inches in length—are barely large enough to preserve his equilibrium. After he had done his turn two men ran up a ladder and helped him into his evercoat. His bed, without which he never travels, is a curiosity. It takes eight men to carry it.

KILLED WITH STONE WAR CLUB

Murdered by a Chief in the Solomon Islands.

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 8.—The French schooner Lord of Isles, while trading in the Solomon Islands, says a late despatch from Sydney, was surrounded by natives when Captain Dennis alone was on board. The chief of the tribe went on board, leaving his warriors in the canoes. Descending the companionway he slipped up behind Captain Dennis, who was seated on a chair, and knocked him over with a stone war club. Dennis sprang on the savage, hauled him up on deck, and threw him overboard. Then he brought two small canoes to bear on the canoes, and sank three of them. The savages who escaped death fled.

In half an hour the crew returned to find Dennis dead, his skull having been broken by the war-club. When the crew reached Sydney they laid the matter before the admirals of the French and British warships at the Australia station. Before sending warships to the Islands both admirals stated that due vengeance would be taken on the natives.

Anglo-Canadian Trade.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Anglo-Canadian trade is showing notable signs of vitality, presumably partly as a result of the new tariff. The High Commissioner's office has received this week eleven different enquiries from firms in Doncaster, Leicester, Dundee, Glasgow, Manchester, Liverpool, Christiania, and Antwerp, anxious to buy or sell in Canada elastic fabrics, boots, spruce boards and timber generally, wheat, grain, oakum, wool, sheep dip, glucose, woodenware, antimony, and butter Scotch Anglo-Canadian traders strongly urge, however, that an equitable insolvency law is absolutely essential.

HONG KONG, Dec. 8.—General Rowdion and Dr. Losada-Juna, representatives of the Filipino Junta, started today for Washington under instructions to "endeavor to remove misapprehension and suspicions and cultivate the friendly relations with the American Government and people."

The Nicaragua Canal.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The Washington correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: "I have ascertained from the highest source that President McKinley has no thought of ignoring or violating British rights under the Clayton-Bulwer treaty. On the contrary, when the proper time arrives England will be invited to co-operate regarding the Nicaragua canal." The Washington correspondent of the Times makes a similar statement.
