Emerson Downs McKinley; Australia Wins Davis Cup

CLEVELAND (AP) — Roy Emerson conceded the opening set to an inspired Chuck McKinley Monday and then rallied for a devastating 3-6, 6-2, 6-4 victory that gave Australia the Davis Cup for the 12th time in the last 15 years.
