CONTRACT BRIDGE

QUIZ

Your right hand opponent deals and bids. One Spade, both sides vulnerable. What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠A62 ♥J8653 ♦A8 ♣A75
2. ♠A78 ♥Q5 ♦KQJ6 ♣A873
3. ♠5 ♥AKJ974 ♦A83 ♣KJ2
4. ♠K7 ♥6 ♣AQ852 ♣AQ84

1. Pass. The safest and the best action to take is to pass. To overcall two hearts with such a shaky suit is much too dangerous. If the next player should be able to double, the result could easily be disastrous.

Overcalls in the two level are primarily based on the number of winning tricks, not points. The element of safety is the first consideration. Even though this had sidation. Even though this hand bid as dealer, before the strength of the other three hands is known, it becomes a dangerous hand with which to act as soon as the right hand opponent announces an opening spade bid.

To make an inforamatory double more cautious but is still unsafe, since partner is apt to respond with one of the minor suits. The pass does not rule out the possibility of reentering the bidding later if the opponents show limited strength.

2. One notrump. It is best to identify immediately the type of hand held. The overall of one notrump has virtually the same requirements as an original notrump bid. The alternate bid, an

inforamatory double, is apt to create a bidding problem we are not prepared to solve when partner responds.

3. Double. The hand is too strong for a two heart bid. There is too much risk partner may properly pass with a hand that can produce a game. Though overcalls in the two level represent good hands, there is a limit to how strong they can be. A double is potentially a stronger bid than an overcall.

A two heart bid would be acceptable if the ace of diamonds were changed to a small diamond. The extra strength above a mere overcall is usually shown by doubling first and later bidding hearts. This makes it possible for partner to distinguish between a competitive bid for a part score and one where there is a decided interest in game.

4. Two diamonds. Here, peculiarly enough, the overcall is recommended rather than the double. Although there is technically the required strength for a takeout double, other considerations make the overcall more advisable. There is too much chance, if we double, that the bidding will climb too high for us to be able to show both suits.

It is better to run an early risk of being dropped on a hand where there might be a game than it is to double and run the risk of not finding the right contract because bidding space becomes cramped. Practical consideration sometimes outweigh technical requirements.

Report Russian Papers For Scientific Meeting Revamped

Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP) — Fifteen hundred geneticists from 47 countries Wednesday started summarizing advances in their field, but almost as much interest was generated by the actions of the Soviet delegation as by the scientific discussions.

A spokesman for the 10th international congress of genetics announced late in the day that Professor T. D. Lysenko, a favorite in Russia during the Stalin regime, may be flying to Montreal for the sessions.

The announcement followed reports that almost the entire program of Russian papers scheduled for presentation during the next week had been revamped.

The Russian geneticist's findings seemed to support the Communist view that man's character and actions are determined by his environment, rather than by heredity.

Western scientists speculated the abrupt withdrawal of the Soviet papers and the announcement that Lysenko may attend the congress could mean the Lysenko group again is becoming the dominant force in Russian genetics.

This group's views were backed by the state in Stalin's era, but in recent years the anti-Lysenko group appeared to have been freer in expressing its views.

Russian scientists denied that Lysenko or the Soviet government had anything to do with the cancellation and substitution of the papers.

"The government minds its own business and the academy of sciences, which guides scientific work in the Soviet Union, minds its own business and does what concerns it," said Professor V. N. Stoletov of the Temi-jazov Agricultural Academy in Moscow, leader of the seven-man delegation attending the sessions.

Professor Stoletov, who also is deputy minister of education in Russia, said the papers were cancelled because some of the geneticists could not attend.

63 British Boys Explore In Remote Labrador Area

CHATER BASIN, Labrador (CP) — Members of the 20th expedition of the British Schools Exploring Society have set up a base camp on this remote Labrador site and plan to stay a while.

Led by Mayor G. S. Murray of the Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards, the 63 boys arrived at Goose Bay, Labrador by chartered plane July 28. They plan to use this camp as a base for explorations scheduled to end Sept. 15.

Averaging 18 years in age, the boys live on hard tack and dehydrated rations—with the exception of margarine donated by a St. John's, Nfld. firm.

They have nine tons of stores and equipment. It was shipped from England earlier. Seven assistant leaders and two medical officers are helping Major Murray with the expedition.

This is the first time the society has visited Labrador. Parties have visited the island province of Newfoundland on seven different occasions since 1934. Other trips took members to Northern Quebec twice and British Columbia once.

Major item on the agenda is a trip to the nearby Mealy Mountains and to the source of the Eagle River, southeast of here.

A spokesman said "the boys are in great heart and eager to make a success of this opportunity, the like of which does not occur often to British boys."

"Contrary to the warning given by the Duke of Edinburgh... the members of the expedition have not... experienced any great discomfort from flies and mosquitoes.

"There is still plenty of time, however, for His Royal Highness' views on the files of Labrador to become painfully real..."

The Newfoundland Employers' Association agreed to a truce last week in a final effort to end a working agreement dispute with the Longshoremen's Protective Union (Ind). No settlement has been reached and the employers have announced suspension and diversion of shipping beginning today.

Informed sources here said "all shipping of any consequence will be stopped." Few of the 900 LPU members are expected to have work on the docks if the employers carry through their plan to have this port boycotted. Their association represents all major freight carriers using harbor facilities.
