Record Is Seen In Making For Canadian Construction

MONTRÉAL (CP)—Canadian construction this year may set a record, Arthur G. Sullivan, president of the Canadian Construction Association, said Monday night in an address to the association's annual dinner.
Construction during the last five years has been around \$7,000,000,000 annually and, Mr. Sullivan said, the outlook for this year is for something closer to \$7,500,000,000. The record was \$7,100,000,000 in 1959.
The expected volume would mean "on-site" employment equivalent to year-round jobs for 600,000 people, plus a greater number "off-site."
