### RAF Fails To Locate Boat With Pair Rowing Atlantic

LONDON (AP) — An RAF search plane investigated without success Sunday the reported sighting of a boat resembling the missing 15-foot Puffin, in which two Britons set out from the United States May 26 to row the Atlantic.

The sighting was reported by an American military pilot about 150 miles northwest of the Bay of Biscay. The search plane reported after seven hours, however, that it had spotted nothing in the area.

Two British journalists—David Johnstone, 34, and John Hoare, 29 — left Norfolk, Va., with 87 days' supply of food and water aboard and got additional supplies from passing ships in the early stages of their journey. They had not been reported for 42 days, when they were sighted about 1,000 miles off Britain and reported in good condition and confident of success.

Relatives and friends have expressed fear for their safety in recent days but British officials have ruled out an organized search because the rowers estimated the journey would take them until November and have not sent a distress signal. They have radio equipment with them.

Johnstone and Hoare have already been beaten in what was billed as a rowboat race across the Atlantic.

### PROTESTS TO CHINA

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain has strongly protested to China against the desecration of graves in the foreigners' cemetery on the outskirts of Peking, the foreign office announced Friday. Foreign Undersecretary Lord Walton summoned Charge d'Affaires Hsiung Hsiang-hui and told him that the foreigners' cemetery, which includes many British graves, was extensively damaged and the graves desecrated.

### Gaudet And Gallant Obtain SDU Awards

### Colored Clouds Are Ejected

WALLOPS ISLAND, Va. (AP) — Three huge multi-colored clouds were ejected over the Atlantic coast by a two-stage rocket Sunday in the second of a series of upper-air studies.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration, which launched the rocket 5.51 a.m. EDT, said the green, red and blue clouds were visible for hundreds of miles.

A NASA spokesman said the barium and copper oxide mixture was ejected in three separate spurts, at 125 and 160 miles above the earth on the rocket's ascent, and again at 160 miles during the descent.

The rising sun illuminated the resulting clouds that started out as green tinged with red and later turned blue. They were tracked for nearly an hour by several monitoring stations along the U.S. east coast and in Bermuda.

NASA conducted the tests jointly with the West German ministry of scientific research to measure the electric fields and wind motion in the upper atmosphere.

Wayne MacLeod was the son of Harvey MacLeod who is working in Toronto and the former Joan Adshade of Halifax.

Dr. J.M. Gillis, the coroner from Eldon, was called and had the body removed to Charlottetown for an autopsy.

KELOWNA, B.C. (CP)—Ronald E. MacBeath of Moncton, N.B., Dominion president of the Royal Canadian Legion, said here Friday he had received a "most frank and fair answer" from Prime Minister Pearson to a question on integration of the armed forces.

He told 200 legion members and wives from the Okanagan area he had written to Mr. Pearson asking that the government make clear its plans for integration.

Mr. MacBeath said the prime minister's reply, received in Kelowna, assured the legion no change would be made until the

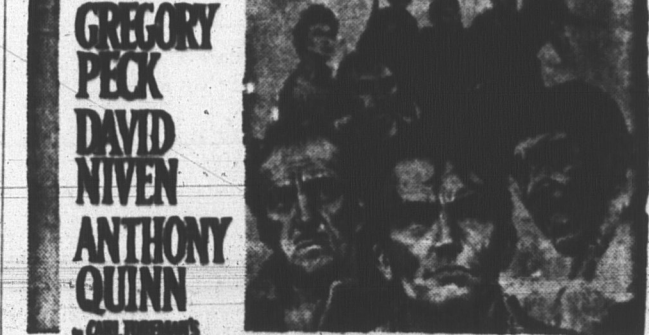
