Expect Dairies To Proceed With Amalgamation

A spokesman for the seven dairies in this county interested in amalgamation stated yesterday that all indications are that the plan will now definitely go into effect. Advise was received yesterday that the Tyne Valley Dairying Co. directors have now voted approval of the plan and this leaves only the Kinkora Cheese Factory to indicate acceptance of the scheme. It is understood that the directors of this company will hold a meeting this week to give final decision on the matter.

When the plan is put into operation the amalgamated companies will carry on operations in the Pioneer Building in Summerside where extensive alterations and additions to the present building are to be made.

The seven companies interested in the amalgamation scheme are the Dunk River Dairying Company, the Grand River Cheese Factory, the Tyne Valley Cheese Factory, the Tryon Dairy, the Egmont Bay Dairy and the Kinkora Cheese Factory.

One hundred and forty-eight similar services were held throughout Canada. Rev. W. A. Harper, minister of the Baptist Church, conducted the service and Archdeacon G. R. Harrison read the Scripture Prayer was said by Rev. C. A. Britten of Bedeque.

The sermon was given by Rev. Burton Crowe of Central Bedeque who traced the history of the English Bible and explained the necessity of a revised version at this time. He said that archaic and ambiguous expressions which obscured the meaning of the text had been eliminated, and that in doing so considerable use had been made of new discoveries of parchments and documents.

The choir for the service was the choir of Kensington United Church under the direction of Rev. L. M. Murray, choir director and organist. The service was largely attended.
