SUPREME COURT.

WEDNESDAY, JAN. 20. This forenoon the Chief Justice imposed sentence upon the criminals as follows:—

The Queen vs. Francis Ellisworth. Larceny of a coat from Owen Coyle after two convictions for larceny. Sentenced to 5 years in Dorchester Penitentiary.

The Queen vs. Newman Hall and John W. McCallum. Larceny of butter, etc., from premises of Joseph Harding and James Lamont. Each was sentenced to five years' imprisonment in Dorchester Penitentiary—two and a half years for each offence. Hall is 25 years of age, McCallum 20.

The Queen vs. Bernard Murphy and William Doyle. Housebreaking and larceny on complaint of J. Wheatley. Each of the prisoners was sentenced to four years in Dorchester Penitentiary. Murphy is 18 years of age and Doyle 19.
