Outdoor Rinks Planned In S'side Next Winter

A partial solution to Summerside's rinkless condition was foreseen in an announcement made last evening by His Worship Mayor Henry Wedge at the regular monthly meeting of the Town Council. He said that two citizens, Messrs J.K. Curran and Harold E. Gaudet will build an open air rink with two ice surfaces provided that they get certain concessions from the town. Mayor Wedge prefaced his remarks by saying that it is understood that the Crystal Rink will not open and the only skating facilities left are those provided by the open air rink which has been operated for some years by the Kinsmen Club and this could not take care of the demand.

He said that these two men plan to build their rink on Notre Dame Street west of the race track and the ice surface will be 109 by 90 feet and 90 by 50 feet. It will be enclosed by a fence and will have a promenade all around; in addition there will be two dressing rooms, toilet facilities and a canteen. Mayor Wedge said that this year's operation would be by way of a test and that a charge will be made for skating and playing hockey.

The town has been asked for concessions in the way of supplying poles and wire and free electric power and water. He said that the Council has decided to cooperate on the matter but that Mayor Wedge stated that if it is successful "these two enterprising gentlemen contemplate having artificial ice for the winter of 1953". He told the meeting that such open air rinks with cement surfaces and artificial ice have been built in Toronto and have been very successful. He congratulated Mr. Curran and Mr. Gaudet and wished them success.

Plan Special Train
Mayor Wedge also announced that the council is planning to run a special train on November 1st, the day of the Royal visit, to take all the school children of the town to Charlottetown to give them an opportunity to see Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. The train would be supervised by voluntary help. He said that the same thing was done some years ago on the visit of the King and Queen and was most successful. Councillor J.L. Gorrill, chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that the pavement has been completed and he understood that all the work has been done "which is a good job as the money is all gone." He hoped there would be no more contracts undertaken.

Mayor Wedge said that a lot of work has been done but it was all worth while and he felt that the citizens are pleased with what has been accomplished.

S'side Wharf Tenders To Be Opened Sept. 19

OTTAWA, Sept. 10 — (Special) —As revealed recently to The Guardian by J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Mayne, the Federal Department of Public Works will spend upwards of \$1,000,000 this year and next in major harbour works at Summerside.

Tenders for reconstruction of the Summerside railway wharf, improvements and dredging are being solicited for the project today and are slated to be opened and a contract awarded on or after September 19.

Magnitude of the Summerside harbour project is reflected in the fact that the tenders are being solicited from engineering firms as far west as Toronto, the rehabilitation of the wharf is in addition to the considerable amount of temporary repair work effected at Summerside during the past two years.

In view of the relative lateness of the season, it is not certain if the main project will go forward until the spring of 1952, however if the successful contractor can assemble his supplies at Summerside together with heavy equipment, the job may proceed this autumn.

Although not earmarked as a national defence project, the Summerside wharf development, officials here say, can contribute indirectly to defence, shipping facilities at the port will be greatly improved and extended and this will be an asset to the defence program as well as a boon to commercial shipping.

While the figure of \$1,000,000 given in departmental estimates is tentative, it is regarded likely that the project will need more than this amount before it is completed.
