

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.

Some exciting scenes took place in the court room during the Guiteau trial to-day. T. MacLane Shaw testified that Guiteau formerly rented a desk room from him and now owned him money. He had frequent conversations with the prisoner, who once told the witness he was bound to have notoriety some way before he died, if he had to kill some big man and imitate Wilkes Booth. At this testimony Guiteau became enraged, and used some abusive language towards witness, calling him a liar, a sneak and a puppy. Several other witnesses testified for the prisoner's vanity, egotism and desire for notoriety, but saw no evidence of insanity.

New York, Dec. 9.

P. Pacacio shot his wife dead and his mother-in-law fatally, then shot himself in the neck this morning. He will recover. Jealousy of his wife is the reported cause of the act.

Baltimore, Dec. 9.

The steamer Galnare, at this port to-day from Port Antonio, encountered heavy gales off the coast of Cuba. The third officer was lost overboard. The Galnare was disabled and towed into the Cape.

Boston, Dec. 9.

An agreement was to-day made between the Pacific and Central National Banks and Mr. C. Weeks, which has been approved by Comptroller Knox, and this, it seems quite probable, will enable the Pacific Bank to resume operations.

Bismarck, D. T., Dec. 8.

The Tribune's special from Miles City says the extensive contracting supply firm and the bank of A. R. Nioiger & Co. have failed. Liabilities, \$285,000.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

London, Dec. 9.

Dr. Lawson, accused of having caused the death of a student at Blenheim House School, Wimbledon, has been remanded, bail being refused.

London, Dec. 9.

Jaspar Tully, editor of the Roscommon Herald, is unconditionally released from Kilmainham jail on account of ill-health. The Times says Sir Samuel Wilson will lodge a petition against Mr. Porter, the successful candidate in the Londonderry election.

Manchester, Dec. 9.

The Guardian's London despatch says it is believed Hon. Hugh Law, Lord Chancellor of Ireland, fully shares the objection of Irish judges to the suspension of the jury system.

London, Dec. 8.

London has been in complete darkness the whole day owing to fog.

Aberdeen, Dec. 9.

Authoritative information has been received that the body of the late Earl Crawford Balcarras has been embarked on board the Italian yacht Speranza, which sailed for Florence.

Brussels, Dec. 9.

An explosion occurred at Cockerill's works, causing the death of sixty-six persons.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 9.

On the occasion of the fete of St. George to-day, the Czar sent a telegram to the Emperor William of Germany, congratulating him as the oldest and most celebrated Knight of the Order of St. George.

EUROPEAN.

Tripoli, Dec. 9.

Intelligence has been received here that a strong French column is approaching the frontier in pursuit of Tunisian insurgents. The Turkish commander is despatching troops to protect the frontier.

Tunis, Dec. 8.

Incessant heavy rains for the last three days have impeded the movements of troops on the coast. The plain around Kairouan is a complete swamp and it is feared that the consequences will be serious for the health of troops.

Vienna, Dec. 9.

The fire broke out in the Prinz Theatre last evening just as the curtain ascended. Upwards of 2,000 persons were in the audience, and when the flames burst out around the stage, on which were 200 performers, a tremendous rush was made from all parts of the house to escape. Many of the panic-stricken leaped from the windows, while the shouts and shrieks of those unable to escape were heart-rending. During the greatest excitement the gas meter connected with the theatre exploded, causing total darkness. At midnight 300 dead bodies were recovered and several hundred more left in the building, which was still in flames. It is now estimated that the loss of life is upward of 500.

Ten thousand florins were subscribed on the Bourse this morning in aid of the families of victims of the fire, who probably were far more numerous than at first believed. Business on the Bourse was suspended during the morning.

The Lower House, Reichsrath adjourned sitting to-day, at the suggestion of the President, after several sympathetic speeches. Hope was expressed that an ample fund be raised for the relief of sufferers by the fire. The official report states that of one hundred and fifty seven bodies taken to the hospitals, ninety-six were those of men and four were those of women, and twenty were so badly burned that their sex is indistinguishable. It appears there were five water taps above the stage which might have been of material assistance in checking the fire at the outbreak, but were not used, in consequence of the panic that ensued.

Researches show that the upper gallery must have fallen into the pit, where the only remains found are small fragments of bone. Beyond doubt nine hundred gallery tickets had been issued. One hundred holds of these are known to have jumped from windows. Competent judges fear that the loss of life will be found to be fully seven hundred. Nothing has been heard of the members of the orchestra. The subscription raised on the Bourse now amounts to £28,000. All the newspapers have opened an edition lists. The Emperor has given a large sum. An official of the theatre states that it was absolutely impossible to lower the iron curtain owing to the frightful rapidity with which the flames spread.

The audience last night was larger than

usual, owing to the fact that the day was a holiday. In the panic the persons responsible for the safety of the theatre neglected to use means for telegraphing to the fire engine stations, which they had at their disposal, and the audience were thus left to struggle in the darkness for ten minutes for means of exit. In an hour and a half the whole building was a roaring furnace. The superintendent states that the conflagration was caused by scenery becoming ignited as the lamps were being lit by the electric current. The number of persons actually reported missing is 609.

SECTION 7.—That the Dominion Government shall assume and defray all the charges for the following services, viz:—
SECTION 8.—Efficient steam service for the conveyance of mails and passengers to be established and maintained between the Island and the mainland of the Dominion, winter and summer, thus placing the Island in continuous communication with the Intercolonial Railway, and the Railway system of the Dominion.

As heretofore, THE EXAMINER will, in 1882, advocate the introduction of improvements calculated to advance the interests of Prince Edward Island, in particular, and the great Dominion of which we form a part, in general.

THE EXAMINER is in favor of cutting down the Local Legislature, consolidating the Local Civil Service on a sound business basis, maintaining a system of rigid economy in the administration of local affairs, and applying the money thus saved to the advancement of the Agricultural and Industrial interests of the Province.

THE EXAMINER'S policy shall be, as it has been, first National and then Political; first for the Island, next for Canada, and then for the Party by which both are governed.
