A special discussion on alternative energy, shelter, and food production will highlight next Wednesday's general meeting of H.O.P.E. In attendance will be Islanders who are developing and operating alternatives. Everyone is welcome to come to this meeting in Room B of the Agricultural Research Station across from the Kentucky Fried Restaurant on University Avenue on Wednesday Feb. 18th at 7:00pm.

H.O.P.E. is an acronym standing for Help Our Provincial Environment. It also implies an optimism towards the future resolution of the pressing and sometimes gloomy environmental issues of today.

Purpose: To be an independent, environmentally concerned and active citizens group.

Objectives: I. To promote

- and encourage conservation practices, especially in agriculture and construction.
- 2. To constructively respond to government and corporate policies and practices which have environmental implications.
- 3. To demand environmental sound government policy and action in areas where there is presently a need.
- 4. To promote and be actively involved in the field of outdoor education.

The Executive consists of the following:

1. Coordinator
2. Secretary-Treasurer
3. Committee Chairperson

There is an annual membership fee of one dollar to cover costs of postage and stationary.

H.O.P.E. was formed in March 1975, and presently has over 60 people on the mailing list. The group has presented briefs and press releases on the following:

- The Land Use Commissions public hearings.
- The first report of the Land Use Commission
- Outdoor education centres to be established at various abandoned community school buildings.
- Environmental implications of the work of the Rural Development Council.
- Point Lepreau Nuclear Power Station - the Island's investment.
- National Week of Nuclear Responsibility
- Environmental implications of the National Park entrance fee.
- Participated in the U.N. Habitat Symposium on Conservation of Land, Water and Energy.

If you are one of the many who don't exactly understand the procedures of the upcoming election, this is what is happening.

VOTER ELIGIBILITY

1. Any student who is a member of the Student Union may vote for the candidate of his/her own choice. This means that if you have paid your \$40.00 S.U. fee you can vote.
2. You may vote for those persons running in your constituency. This means you may vote for all Executive positions of the S.U. (President, Comptroller, etc.). As well, if you are an Arts student you may vote for the people running for Arts representative. In this case, you indicate on your ballot your first six choices, not just your first one because there are six seats available to these candidates.
