ALBIN JOSEPH ARSENAULT

The community of Charlottetown and vicinity was shocked and saddened when on Sunday July 3rd, word was received of the sudden death of Craftsman Albin Joseph Arsenault at the early age of 21 years.

He was the son of Mrs. Andrew Arsenault and the late Mr. Arsenault of Charlottetown. He was born in Sept. 1851 Craftsman Arsenault enlisted with the R.C.E.M.E. and in Feb. 1954 went to Korea and returned home in Feb. 1955. He was then posted to Valcartier, Quebec and transferred to Gagetown, N. B. where he met his death in a civilian car accident. He was comforted by the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church administered to him by the Army Chaplain of Gagetown, N.B.

He will be missed by his many relatives and friends, and because of his respect for young and old alike was a friend where ever he went.

He was born in Egmont Bay, P.E.I. on May 20th, 1934, and moved to Charlottetown with his parents when he was six years old. His father predeceased him 6 yrs. ago.

Besides his sorrowing mother he is survived by five sisters and four brothers namely—Sally (Mrs. Mack Nicholson) Charlottetown; Aline (Sister St. Raymond) Tignish, P.E.I.; Alma (Mrs. Phil McCaffrey) St. Stephen, N.B.; Marie (Mrs. Edgar Hebert) Rexton, N.B.; Julia (Mrs. Jerry LeClair) Toronto, Ont.; Joseph St. John, N.B.; Emile of Montreal, Que. and Alfred and Raymond at home.

The deceased was accorded full military honours at the funeral which was held from his late residence to St. Dunstan's Basilica where Solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Corcoran, Deacon and Sub-Deacon were Rev. Clarence Roche and Rev. Justin MacDonald. Rev. Bernard Gillis assisted in the choir.

Interment was in the Roman Catholic Cemetery where the service was conducted by Rev. Francis Corcoran.

The Firing Party was under command of S.Q.M.S.C.E. Ryan. Representing R.C.E.M.E. was Lieutenant J. N. Courtney, Gagetown, N. B. Major R. J. Mahar represented the Charlottetown Garrison.

The Legion graveside service was conducted by Comrade Leo Doyle. Last post and Reveille were sounded by Bugler Corporal W. D. Chaisson.

British Coal Order Is Glimmer Of Hope In N.S.

SYDNEY (CP)—Harold Gordon, chief of coal operations for the far-flung Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, said Thursday a new British order is a glimmer of hope in the bleak Maritime coal picture.

Mr. Gordon said the 220,000-ton order for Cape Breton coal would probably prevent further layoffs in Nova Scotia mines which now employ about 10,000 men.

He added, however, that the order will not reopen Glace Bay's big No. 1-B colliery which closed June 30 because of depressed markets and high production costs.

Many of the 725 miners thrown out of work by the closure have gone into other mines and others will fill vacancies in Dosco pits as they become available, he said.

Mr. Gordon said the chief effect of the coal order will be prevention of idle time in pits next year. "NO NEW JOBS"

It is unlikely the order will create any new jobs since it can be filled under current production schedules.

"It will help to avoid any idle time," Mr. Gordon. "That's the big thing."

Shipments of the first 130,000 tons purchased by the United Kingdom's national coal board is to be delivered by March 31, 1956, and will be assisted by a maximum federal subvention of \$2.20 a ton.

Arrangements for subventions on the remaining 90,000 tons are expected to be made later next year.

Thursday's announcement brings to two the orders received by Dosco from Britain since a show-down conference earlier this year at which management and Nova Scotia government officials argued.

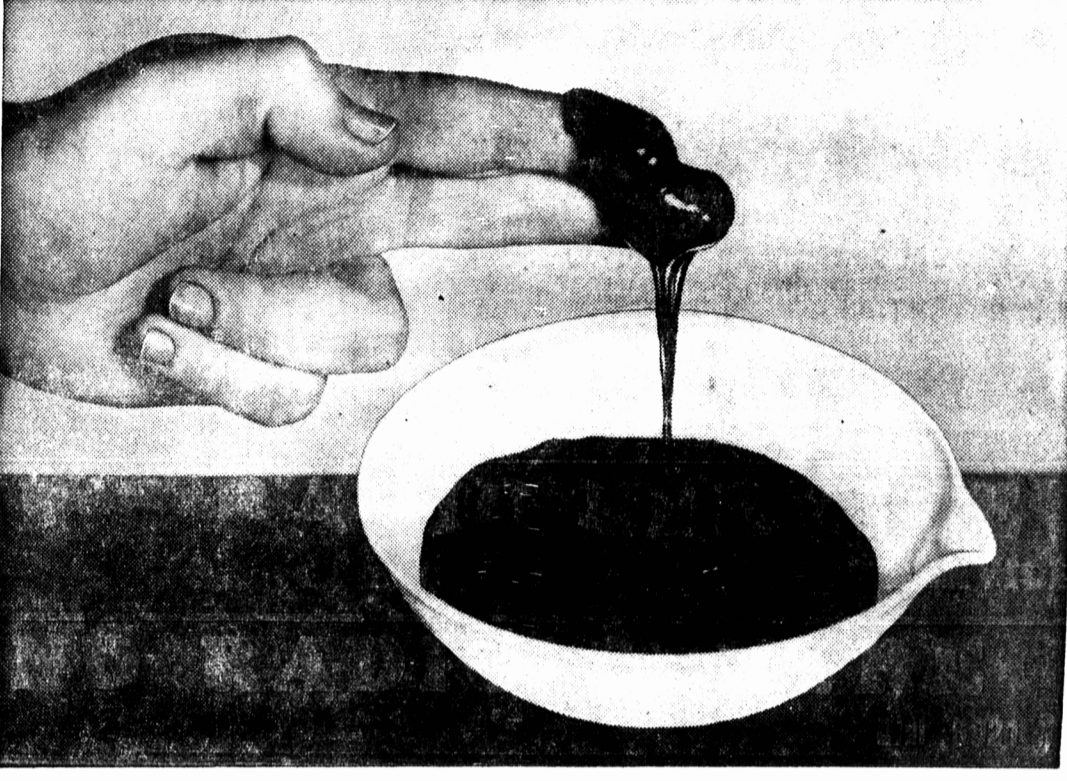

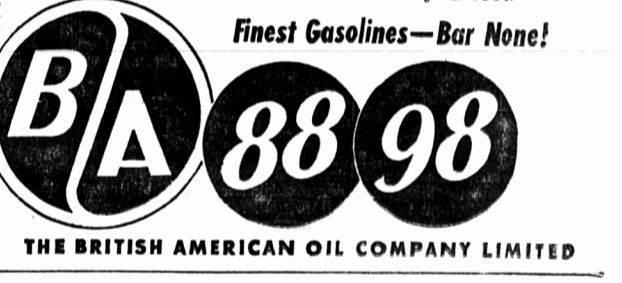

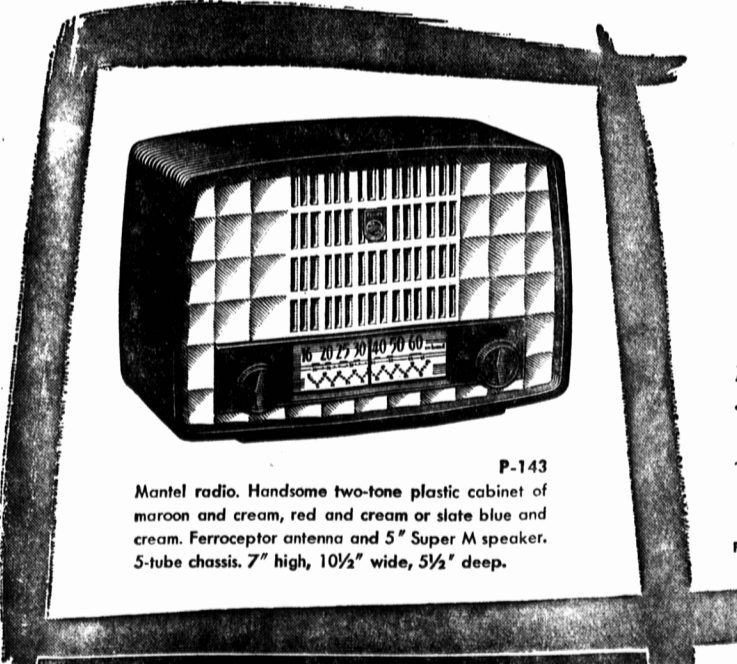
