# Agreement Invalid

Tenant students have not signed an official lease agreement and should be prepared to take the university administration to court over violations of the Landlord and Tenant Act: that was the opinion of provincial Rentalsman John Comeau Tuesday.

Comeau told this newspaper that any legal decisions will be made only in court, but if resident students are having problems with their landlord, the administration,

they should have Student Union representation to clean up the situation; in court, if necessary. Within a short while, the Student Union expects to have several copies of the Landlord and Tenant Act and a Summary of the Act for every resident student.

Student senator Derek Key has sent a notice of motion for the senate to the chairman concerning the problems now being encountered in the residences. Please see story page 10.

## Under-18's get a break

Two hundred and fifty full time UPEI students are under 18 this semester and last Thursday night student union had the task of deciding what to do about admitting them to pig and whistles and other licensed affairs on campus.

These students have all paid their \$40.00 union fees but presently are unable to attend the majority of S.U. sponsored events.

During orientation the Barn was licensed only in the Panther Lounge which meant overcrowding down-

stairs. It was felt by several council members that a similar arrangement should be made to accomodate these students.

Before setting up a regular schedule for these events council decided it would be best to find out if those under eighteen were indeed interested in attending and whether or not attendance would drop with those over eighteen feeling inconvenienced by there being only one bar.

The first attempt will be within two weeks and will be well publicized.

## Labor Unsure of action

Union leaders across the country are trying to gain support for their general strike that will be held on October 14th. The day of protest against the wage and price controls was thought of as a chance to give organized labour's problems national attention. It was hoped that all labour would join the walk-out.

At UPEI, the two labour unions on campus, CUPE and IBEW, have decided to let the locale decide by member vote. So far neither union has taken the vote. It would seem labour is playing a waiting game with

the university. What is at stake is the punishment given to workers if they walk-out. So far the university has not revealed what ramifications, if any, will be handed out to striking workers.

It would seem labour doesn't want to vot until they know what the score is from the university. The university has not said what their position is. Depending upon that decision is the union vote. If the two unions decide one hundred percent in favour of the day of protest, the university should close up for the day.
