Three Men Are Committed For Trial On Milk Theft Charges

James Arthur Clinton, Gerald Earle Arsenault and David George Mamye were all committed for trial in higher court by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet at a special session of the Queen's County Magistrate's Court last evening. All three are appearing in defense of charges laid against them by the R.C.M.P. in connection with the alleged theft of a quantity of canned and powdered Perfection brand milk, the property of Central Creameries Ltd. of Charlottetown.

At hearings previous to last night's, Clarence Reid and Stanley Dingwell were committed for trial by a higher court. The case of the sixth member originally charged in connection with the alleged crime, Charles Samuel Mamye, was discharged last night when evidence provided by Crown witnesses proved insufficient for a higher court trial. After consideration of evidence given at a previous session, one of the three charges that had been lodged against Clarence Reid, was also dismissed, thus concluding the preliminary hearing into the incident.

McCulloch Saw-Draw Contest

A new contest in which 150 McCulloch chain saws will be given away free is announced by Kelih Carmichael, McCulloch dealer in this area, whose store is located on Brackley Point Road, and Edgar Cannon, Summerside district. Each winner will be awarded a D-44, the lightest and most powerful direct-drive chain saw on the market. "This brand new power tool is so powerful and well-balanced that it seems to feed itself right into the wood," the dealer said. "In fact, we call it the saw with the light touch because it requires so little effort by the operator."

It is not necessary to purchase a saw to enter the Saw-Draw, the dealer emphasized. But if a new McCulloch chain saw prior to his name's being drawn, he will be awarded three times the advertised list price of the saw he purchased. "Women constitute half of the voting power of the country and I believe that the day is not too far distant when they will be more largely represented in the House of Commons at Ottawa and also be elected to seats in the Legislature," he said.

Touching on the need for continued activity on the part of the organization, Premier Matheson said that discouragement should not be in evidence when requests are not implemented at once. "Many reforms in the political life of the Province have been inaugurated by organizations such as yours", he said.
