CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer, East-West vulnerable.

The bidding:
 South West North East
 1♥ Pass 3♥ Pass 4♥

East takes the queen. West showing out, and cashes the king. East then leads a club which South ruffs.

The original situation has changed. The former uncertainty about the number of trump losers is cleared up, but the spade loser remains, and a diamond loser is possible. True, the diamond loser is remote, but since it is the only thing that jeopardizes the contract, suitable allowances have to be made.

Declarer therefore leads the ace of diamonds and a low diamond to the queen. When East shows out, the potential diamond loser materializes. The problem now is to avoid the loser in one way or another, else the contract will be lost.

Our old friend, the elimination play, is invoked. The defenders are out of hearts, while we still have a trump left in each hand. Dummy's hand and ours are out of clubs. The next step is to eliminate spades from both hands to set up a sure-fire end-play.

The A-K of spades are cashed and a spade is led from dummy. East producing the jack. When this trick gets around to West, he has a Hobson's choice.

If he ducks, East will have to return a club, permitting South to shake a diamond loser as the club is ruffed in the other hand.

Or if West takes the spade with the queen, he must either give the declarer a ruff-discard, or else lead a diamond from the J-9 into South's K-10.

Red China And Leader Assessed By Writer

The hierarchy of world communism, including Nikita Khrushchev, is flocking to Peking for celebration of the 10th anniversary of the Chinese "People's Republic." On the eve of the anniversary, here's an assessment of Red China and its leader Mao Tse-tung by an American reporter who was on hand when history was made a decade ago.

The Chinese Communist capital of Yanan tottered in 1947 before the advancing armies of Chiang Kai-shek. The outlook seemed bleak for Red leader Mao Tse-tung and his ragged followers.

"You are withdrawing from Yanan in retreat. Have you given up? Does this mean the end of communism in China?" That was what I asked Mao when I met him at the tiny Yanan airstrip.

Mao, in padded blue cotton patches at the elbows, looked over the Shensi hills. "Mr. Rodrick," he said with the faintest trace of a smile, "I invite you to visit us in Peking two years from now."

The story of how Mao's armies whirled suddenly and launched the counter-offensive against Chiang which brought them to power is history now.

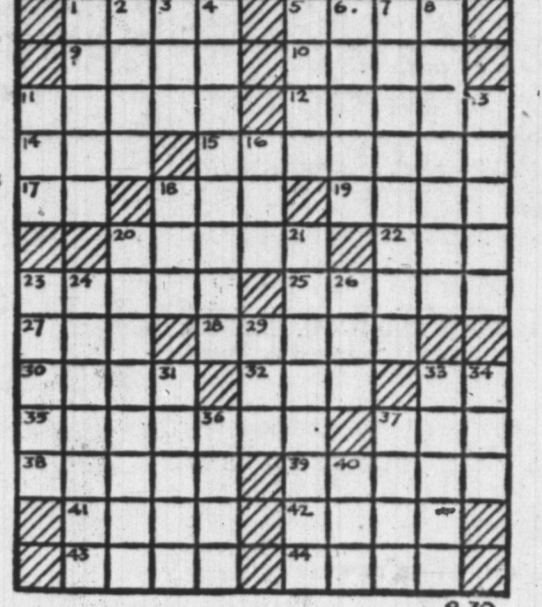
In less than two years this son of a Hunan peasant and his followers had exchanged their caves for sumptuous quarters under the blue and yellow tile roofs of the "forbidden city" in Peking, ancient home of emperors.

Spanish Trawl Methods Studied

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — A team of Canadian fishing experts is in the Grand Banks area off Newfoundland this week taking a long look at a trawling method developed by Spanish fishermen.

The "pair" trawling method used two vessels about the size of conventional Canadian trawlers dragging a large trawl between them. The Spanish fleet used it extensively.

Among those observing the operation are Dr. W. R. Martin, senior groundfish specialist at the fisheries research board's St. Andrews, N.B. station, Eugene Gorman, deputy fisheries minister in Prince Edward Island, and Capt. Earl Demore, and Capt. Anns Crouse, Lunenburg, N.S., fishing vessel skippers.

They are on the banks aboard the fisheries patrol boat Lamna.

But the ironic truth is that a great Chinese emperor, Shih Huang-ti, had anticipated the methods and philosophy of Chinese communism to an extraordinary degree 2,100 years before. Some observers feel Mao, a deep student of Chinese history, has used him, not Marx, as a model.

Builder of the Great Wall, unifier of slave armies, the Marxism of Shih's day was called "legalism." It advocated controlled prices, nationalization of capital and state monopoly of trade.

Shih boasted that his dynasty would endure a thousand years. It collapsed in 15.



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
