### One's Self Is One's Fate, Others Can't Change It

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: I am 32, divorced and remarried, with two sons, ages 11 and 5, one by each husband. My husband was a draftsman when we married, 18 months after we met. Everything was fine at first. He got an apartment for us near his camp. Many nights he couldn't be home because of his duties; and I, being lonesome, went out with two other men.

After his discharge we came home and our son was born. Everything was fine, but he worked nights and went to college, hence was hardly ever home. I started seeing his brother. Then my husband was in an accident that left him paralyzed in a wheelchair.

In a few months I got a divorce on grounds of neglect, telling people that I had learned he was being unfaithful. Actually, I didn't want to be tied to a cripple.

During the following year I was engaged to three different men and married the third when I thought I was pregnant. I wasn't but pregnancy developed later. I knew that our marriage was a mistake within the hour and have been miserable ever since.

My new husband, who fancies himself a ladies' man, has been stepping out on me, though I can't prove it. So I started stepping out on him too. I can't go on this way.

I want to go back to my first husband, make things right with him, work and take care of him as I should have from the beginning. I do love him and could be faithful to him. I am sure he still loves me and doesn't know what I've been doing over the years. But I am afraid I couldn't make it, financially. He loves both boys, even though the younger isn't his. I am about to crack up staying home. P. S.: If my present husband knew what I have in mind he would take his son away from me, and maybe the older boy too. Please help me. T. W.

DEAR T. W.: In your letter here condensed, you mention speaking of returning to your first husband: "Sex would be no problem as he is paralyzed and would be home every night." I am sure you are not a naive woman, so I am about to crack up, staying home.

So far, your marriage history seems to be a case of leaping from the frying pan into the fire as if in hopes of escaping from the confines of your own skin. In short, as if by changing your moorings, from one set of circumstances and associates to another, you might somehow become somebody new, in charge of living a new and more satisfactory life.

In essence, one's self is one's fate. And you won't change yourself or your fate on a iota, by leaping in and out of "selected" situations just for the sake of hoped-for change.

Wherever you go, whatever you do, you will still be you, carrying the same old ferment of instability, two-timing untrustworthiness, frivolous flightiness, thus giving you a passkey to footloose sociability in the evenings, which you may lack in your present circumstances.

As for your idea that sex would be no problem in wifely relation to him henceforth, what does that mean? That his invalid status rules out sex? If so, are you sure that wouldn't be a problem? Or do you mean that his bondage to a wheelchair automatically brings an end to rival feminine rivalry for his interest?

In my judgement, you are simply impulsively and unreasonably grabbing at rootless arguments for leaping, once more, out of a reality situation into a day dream concept of "change for the better". The only reliable help for you is first-hand professional family relations counselling, to guide and support you in facing up to the problem-making factors in your own personality, that are at the center of your growing fret and confusion about "What to do next?" So my advice is, enlist such help immediately. M. H.
