Queen's County Fish And Game Ass'n Meeting

Three resolutions were passed at the monthly meeting of the Queen's County Fish and Game Protection Association last evening with the recommendation that they be passed on to the Provincial Executive for presentation to the Minister of the Department of Industry and Natural Resources.

Mr. Harold Shaw, President, conducted the meeting which passed the motions on the resolutions which read as follows:

1. That the daily bag on rabbits be limited to five, possession limited to five, commercial sale of rabbits for other than human consumption be prohibited, and that in future the rabbit be considered a game animal as well as a fur-bearing animal.

2. That the Department continue the bounty on foxes the year round.

3. That the Department place a bounty on coyotes again this year.

These resolutions arose out of much discussion as to the best means of preventing the unnecessary killing of rabbits, and consequently build up the rabbit population of this Province which has fallen off drastically within the past few years.

The chairman announced at the opening of the meeting that Mr. Frank Macdonald had been appointed by the executive as Secretary Treasurer for the present year.

Various reasons were given by members in attendance for the apparent falling off of the number of rabbits, the major one seeming to be the increasing number of wild foxes at present on the Island. It was also stated that 14500 more gun licenses were issued this year than ever before.

One suggestion made to assist in ridding the Province of the foxes was that organized fox hunts be organized in the fall by the Association.

It was also announced that a crowd shooting contest would again be held this year and that a much larger prize list was anticipated. Mr. B. Graham Rogers told the meeting he would offer a prize of ammunition to the value of five dollars to the junior bringing in the most crows.

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Will Appeal

Mr. Garson announced, the Government will bring in specific legislation to ensure that coarse grains traders—outside of the one directly involved in this case—do not profit as the result of the Government's losing the case.

Lists Objections

He listed these seven objections to compulsory military training in the reserve forces at this time:

"1. We have not the training staff available to carry this out.

"2. We have not the drill halls.

"3. It would create a false sense of security wholly unrelated to the urgency of the situation.

"4. It would divert attention and divert manpower from the immediate and urgent task of creating forces in being.

"5. It would mean an immense withdrawal of manpower at a time when this country is short of manpower to produce those things which nature has made it possible for us to produce for our Allies as well as ourselves.

"6. We have not before us in this House, outside of the Government, much of the information which is essential to an adequate consideration of this problem.

"7. No other country with a similar dual type of force has yet adopted, and I believe for good reasons, a form of compulsory service in the secondary force."

The question of national selective service was not an issue.

"No matter how or when it may be adopted, the principle of national selective service, it seems to me, has been settled," he said.
