and all others whom it may concern, to take due notice hereof, and
to give their ready obedience accordingly.

Atlantic Cable broken.

SACKVILLE, Aug. 15, 8 p. m.

The Steamship "Moravian," at Farther Point, Saturday,
brought news of the "Great Eastern." Cable gave out on
the 2nd. When "China" left on 5th, communication had
not been re-established. To-day we get dates from Heart's
Content, Newfoundland, to the 14th. Schooner arrived
there. Saw "Great Eastern" and "Terrible" on the 6th.
They told Schooner that Cable parted on the 2nd. Schooner
saw a beacon buoy put down to show where they lost it.
