NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—Lou Chiozza, infielder of New York Giants, broke his left leg in two places today in a collision with left fielder Joe Moore in the ninth inning of the Giants' 4-3 defeat by St. Louis Cardinals at the Polo Grounds.

Chiozza, playing shortstop due to the suspension of Billy Jurges, backed into short left field at the start of the ninth to take a high fly hit by Cardinal pitcher Clyde Slocum. He bumped into Moore just after catching the ball for a successful putout, and both men went down in a heap.

Moore was able to rise and play out the inning. Chiozza was carried off the field and rushed to Poly-clinic Hospital.

Pastor To Meet Champion In 20-round Title Fight In Detroit On Sept. 20

BY DALE STAFFORD Associated Press Sports Writer DETROIT, July 17 (AP)—For the first time in 20 years the heavyweight boxing championship of the world will be defended in a scheduled bout of 20 rounds when titlist Joe Louis and Bob Pastor, of New York, step in the ring at Briggs Stadium here the night of Wednesday, Sept. 20.

Promoter Mike Jacobs, of New York, who signed both principals some time ago, came to Detroit today, completed negotiations for renting Briggs Stadium and announced the date of the contest which will mark Louis' eighth defence of his crown, more title fights than any other heavyweight champion has engaged in.

The Michigan boxing law permits title fights to be of 20 rounds duration and at the request of Pastor and his manager, James J. Johnston, Jacobs ordered the contest to be of this scheduled length.

It is noted that a 20 round bout had been arranged for him just as he completed a round of golf, Louis

said: "I don't care if its 20 rounds or 50 rounds 'cause this time I'll set my own limit."

Louis and Pastor fought in New York, five months before Joe won the title from James J. Braddock, with the present champion tritling up in 10 rounds. Following the bout Louis' handlers accused Pastor of "bicycling" in an effort to make the Brown Bomber look bad. This charge was denied by Pastor and Johnston as they clamored for a rematch.

Financial terms of the bout as announced by Jacobs were: 1. Forty per cent of the net receipt for Louis; 17 1-2 per cent for Pastor.

2. Nine per cent of the net receipts to owner Walter Briggs of Detroit Tigers for the use of the stadium which was a seating capacity of 80,000 for a boxing match.

Jacobs predicted the fight, the first heavyweight championship ever to be held in Detroit, would draw a gross gate of between \$400,000 and \$500,000. Ticket prices will range from \$2 to \$27.50.
