

Saints Win N.B.-P.E.I. Basketball Crown

Defeat UNB 52-40 In Clincher Here Saturday Play St. F. X. In Finals

Saint Dunstan's University won the N. B.-P. E. I. Intercollegiate Basketball Championship 52-40 in a thrilling game at the S.D.U. Gymnasium.

The Saints, strong in the opening minutes and in the final quarter, led all the way to retain the title they won a year ago. As a result of their first win the Saints will meet St. F. X. in the Maritime finals with the first game being played here probably this week.

St. Dunstan's went into an early 10-2 lead and ended the first quarter ahead 12-6. The visitors started to click in the second quarter and pulled to within two points of the Saints at the half, the score being 23-21.

The teams scored basket after basket throughout most of the third quarter. At one time the scoreboard read 30-29 in favor of the Saints. The Saints then pulled away to lead 41-36 as the third quarter ended.

The see-saw battle continued throughout the first part of the final quarter until the visitors opened up in an attempt to win the game. The Saints then struck for two baskets by Johnny Taylor to put the game out of the reach of the visitors.

Playing coach Jack Reardon scored 20 points for S.D.U. The visitors kept Reardon at long range but Jack kept connecting on enough long shots to keep his team ahead throughout. Reardon's shooting average was lower than usual due to the fact that many of his shots were from very far out.

Johnny Taylor, the rebound artist was runner-up to Reardon with 11 points. Taylor played consistent ball and in the final quarter scored two very important baskets along with two foul shots to clinch the win for the Saints.

Gus Dorais was a standout for St. Dunstan's. He gave the best ball-handling display of the season, set up countless plays, scored eight points and rebounded like a fiend under his own basket. Dorais set up Taylor for his two game-clinching baskets in the final quarter.

HALIFAX, (CP) — Sydney Millionaires moved to within a single game of the Maritime Major Hockey League lead Saturday night by shutting out Halifax Atlantics 8-0 in a regularly scheduled game here.

Sydney's attack on the league leading Atlantics was sparked by Jean (Gee) Renaud, a new player who tallied twice and assisted on another goal. The win put Sydney 11 points ahead of Glace Bay Miners and 17 points ahead of Charlottetown Islanders, who failed to keep a date in Glace Bay Saturday.

Specs Chorley got Sydney off to an early start by scoring in the first minute of play. Charlie Marshall got the first of his two goals in the same period.

Renaud's goals and assists came in the second period, when Marshall scored his second and Lorne Pirie and Ray Lacroix also scored. George Robertson got the lone goal of the third period.

The third period was studied with squabbles and nine penalties were handed out. Marshall and Doug McPhee were tagged with minors, and a few minutes later McPhee and Andy McCallum drew the same. Bill Arcand got a misconduct at 18:17, and Doug McNeil and Dunc McIntyre got minors and majors at 18:36.

Major League Schedule For Next Week Is Revised; Islanders Club Fined \$650

The Maritime Major Hockey League executive ditched the rest of the old 1953-54 schedule here Sunday and introduced a new one designed chiefly to keep Glace Bay Miners from financial collapse.

Several delegates had proposed at the special meeting that play-offs be started this week. However, the executive voted to take regular season play through to March 8, the date originally set for it to finish.

The executive decided to review the standings of the four-team circuit next Saturday. The league will close then if games still unplayed would make no difference to the ultimate rankings. An attempt will be made at the same time to work in postponed games, like the four Charlottetown Islanders have built up.

Financially Pressed
Glace Bay delegate Gordon Clark said the Miners were out at least \$5,500 because of Charlottetown's repeated failure to show up in Glace Bay for scheduled games. Moreover, Clark said, the club now was \$10,000 behind—about two weeks—in salaries to players.

Delegates promised to help the Miners financially but no fixed amount was set. They also would benefit from the extra two home games which resulted from the changed schedule.

Halifax was given permission to replace right winger Bob Pepin. Pepin was forced to return to his Quebec home last week because of a family illness. The league also told Charlottetown it could import a substitute for pro Tod Campeau who refused to report for duty.

Sydney Millionaires were ordered to cut a player loose and conform to the legal maximum of 15 men. Among those remaining is Charlie Marshall whose eligibility often has been questioned by Glace Bay.

Islanders To Pay
The Miners vainly sought executive approval of a motion which would have dumped the second-place Millionaires into fourth place. Glace Bay asked that the points which Sydney piled up with Marshall in the lineup be given to the club that lost.

Charlottetown was ordered to pay \$500 to Glace Bay to settle all differences arising from postponed games.

The executive wiped out a two-game suspension against forward Bob Bonness and a six-game penalty on defenceman Carroll Bloom of Halifax Atlantics. But league president C. Roy MacDonald announced that Halifax defenceman Bill Arcand had been fined \$50 and barred for three games for crashing into linesman Reg Beazley at Halifax Saturday night. Arcand's suspension becomes effective Tuesday night.

Queens County Hockey Playdowns Commence At Forum This Evening

The Queen's County intermediate hockey play-offs commence at the Forum tonight with four teams going into action in the all-important opening games.

The Parkdale Bombers meet the Milton Hornets in the first game at seven o'clock. In the second game the Cornwall Meteors play the Nine Mile Creek Bulldogs.

The Bombers and Hornets are old rivals having played against each other throughout the winter of the Crapaud-Victoria League. Their games were always evenly contested affairs and tonight's clash between the two clubs is expected to produce another of these thrilling hockey duels.

The same goes for the Cornwall-Nine Mile Creek games. They have opposed each other in the North River League for the past several weeks and the strong rivalry built up between the teams will be very much in evidence this evening.

All indications point towards a very large crowd of fans being on hand for the two games.

Play for the Seagram Trophy will commence this evening at the Charlottetown Curling Club at seven o'clock. Veteran curler G. G. Hughes will throw the first stone on Ice 1 for Skip Hon. T. W. L.
