CONVENT DE NOTRE DAME.

A Large Audience Witnessed the Closing Exercises Last Evening.

The closing exercises of the Convent de Notre Dame took place in the spacious hall last evening, in the presence of a large audience, amongst whom we noticed His Lordship Bishop Macdonald and a large number of clergymen, His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Howland, Consul Kane and Mrs. Kane, Dr. Anderson and Mrs. Anderson, and Professor Casen. The pupils were seated in a semi-circle on the stage, with the performers in the centre and the walls in and about the stage were tastefully decorated. The whole programme was presented in a manner most creditable alike to those who took part and to the institution. Everything tended to impress one with the thoroughness of the work being done by the good Sisters of the Convent. From the opening overture to "God Save the Queen," every number was well rendered. The pupils of the Convent de Notre Dame have always been noted for their excellence in vocal and instrumental music, and last evening's exercises clearly indicated that they are more than keeping up their reputation.

The play by the junior pupils, "Lost Among the Fairies," was rendered in an exceedingly clever manner, the little ones taking their respective parts with an ease and grace worthy of older heads. The play was a resume of the history of the province, and each young lady sustained her part splendidly. The various characters were appropriately costumed, and the dramatic ability displayed was in the highest degree creditable. The characters in the drama were taken by Misses K. Kelly, B. Oliver, N. "Thanks," in living characters, was another most pleasing and decidedly interesting and most edifying programme. The different letters in the word were artistically formed, and the drill incidental to the formation of the letters was cleverly executed.

"Joan of Arc at Rouen" was also a splendid number. The prologue by Miss M. H. Clarkin was decidedly interesting, and the vocal solo by Miss Marie DeLisle was exceedingly well rendered.

The salutatory, "Memories of Alma Mater," by Miss E. Sullivan, was a well-written production, and it was well read. The salutatory, "Sunshine and Shadow," by Miss B. Coonan, was another well-written and splendidly-read essay, which was well received. Miss Coonan spoke of the many happy hours they had passed within the convent precincts, and referred in feeling terms to the regret felt at saying farewell to teachers and classmates.

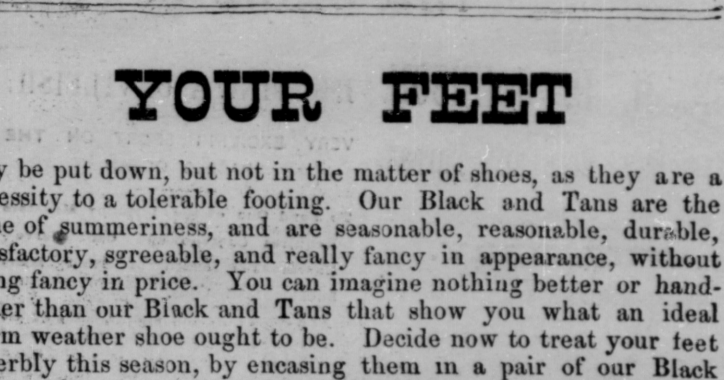
