SUMMER HAZARD

SYDNEY, Australia (CP) — Eastern Australia had a heat wave before the year came to a close, with bush fires ranging over large areas of New South Wales and Victoria states. Along the southern N. S. W. coast winds blew ashes and debris over several towns with temperatures well over 100 degrees.

MONTEAL, (CP) — Pedestrians and motorists moved at a crawl in Montreal Wednesday as the year's biggest snowstorm dumped more than seven inches of soggy snow on the city.

More than 50 persons, including some small children, were forced out into the blizzard when fire swept a downtown apartment block. The fire was caused mainly by the first floor of the three-storey building but smoke made the upper sections uninhabitable.

Airlines and bus companies reported delays and some cancellations. Police reported more than 100 minor traffic accidents but there were no fatalities or serious injuries.

The icebreakers N. B. MacLean and Ernest Lapointe, beating their way up the St. Lawrence river toward Sorel, Que., were forced to halt because of poor visibility.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

CLOSING OF ROADS REGULATIONS

The following Regulations are made this 5th day of January, 1954, by the Minister of Public Works and Highways, under sub section (c) of Section 56 of the Public Works and Highways Act, Revised Statutes Prince Edward Island, 1951, Chapter 135:

1. In these Regulations—

(a) "Heavy Traffic" means a motor vehicle having a gross weight, with load, in excess of 6,000 pounds.

(b) "Light Pavement" means these roads in the Province which have been paved with light pavement, and includes the following roads: Montague to Murray Harbour via Murray River 17.0 miles Day's Corner to Wellington 2.8 miles Cornwall to Churchill via Clyde River 5.0 miles Mt. Edward Road from Experimental Farm Northwest 1.5 miles Palmer's Lane 0.4 miles Kensington Road to Mt. Edward Rd. via Belvedere Corner 1.3 miles Charlottetown Airport on Brackley Pt. Road northwest 2.5 miles St. Peter's Road to about 1 mile northwest of York Station 2.5 miles Hillsboro Bridge to Mt. Herbert via Bunbury 3.2 miles

(c) "Newspaper Publication" means publication in some newspaper published in the Province.

(d) "Pavement" means roads in the Province which have been paved.

(e) "Public Notice" means notice to the public given by or on behalf of the Minister, either by newspaper publication or by radio announcement to the effect that roads are closed to traffic as mentioned therein or that such restrictions have been removed.

(f) "Radio Announcement" means announcement over a radio broadcasting station within the Province.

(g) "Traffic" means motor vehicle traffic.

2. Roads, pavement and light pavement shall be closed to heavy traffic or to all traffic from midnight of the day when public notice of such closing is first given, and shall remain so closed until public notice has been given removing such restrictions.

3. Any such public notice may advertise or announce the closing to traffic, or to heavy traffic only, of light pavement only, or of all pavement, or of all roads in the Province.

4. A radio announcement may announce a public notice on Sunday or a holiday.

5. The members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and other Peace Officers in the Province shall enforce these Regulations.

6. In prosecutions for offences against these Regulations, the production of

(a) A copy of a newspaper containing a public notice, or

(b) An affidavit by the manager or person in charge of a radio broadcasting station that a public notice has been announced over such station, stating the date of the radio announcement, and the words used therein.

shall be conclusive evidence of the contents of any public notice and of the date and fact of its newspaper publication or radio announcement.

5. The emphasis on mass-appeal might have a bad long-range effect on society, and it omits "valuable broadcasts for minorities."

"If broadcasts only follow the accepted taste of the majority as calculated by TV producers, television will not contribute to society but rather level off the peaks of cultural tradition and achievement," UNESCO said.

Amateur TV Service

The survey said the United States has 22,000,000 of the world's 25,750,000 TV sets.

In West Germany, which has not yet started regular television service, there is only one set for every 8,000 persons. In Britain there is a set for every 24 persons.

There is a strong movement for amateur television in Russia, the survey said. At Kharkov, enthusiasts have built their own sets and set up a complete telecasting station.

In France, whole villages sometimes chip in and buy a co-oper-

ative TV set, which is kept in the local schoolhouse.

In another of the 21 countries surveyed, Holland, there are 10,000 sets, although programs are telecast only six hours a week.

The survey concluded that research in the United States and in Britain had "clearly demonstrated the profound impact which television is making upon modern society."

THIEVES WRECK CHURCH

MONTEAL, (CP)—Folled robbers of church poor-boxes turned their rage on a church's ornaments Monday night. Rev. Joachim Dumback of the Polish Holy Trinity church told police apparently one or two men entered the church about eight o'clock and tried to rifle the poor-boxes. When they failed they set fire to the altar napkin and smashed several candle-holding glasses.

Want Probe Of Kinsey Report

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Representative Carroll Reece (Rep., Tenn.) Wednesday said his congressional committee has received a number of requests to investigate the financial backers of the Kinsey report.

Reece, who heads a committee to investigate tax-exempt foundations, told reporters there are no plans to call Dr. Alfred C. Kinsey as a witness.

The senator said he was "surprised" to learn that Kinsey's latest report, "Sexual Behavior in the Human Female" was made possible by several foundations which supply financial backing for the institute for sex research at Indiana University.

Reece said he believes his committee has jurisdiction to inquire into the matter but that it has made no plans.
