Cathedral's History Outlined At Historical Society Annual

The first three ministers of St. Peter's Anglican Cathedral served for a total of 83 years, a record in North America, stated Canon E.M. Malone last night.

He was addressing the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Historical Society on the "Foundation of St. Peter's Cathedral Church". Dr. Frank MacKinnon, president, presided over the meeting which was held at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Canon Malone was the third minister to serve at the cathedral, which was founded in 1869. He was preceded by Rev. G.W. Hodgson and Rev. C. Simpson. Dr. Cuthbert Simpson, son of the second minister, is now dean of Christ Church in Oxford, England.

Founded as a direct outcome of the Oxford Movement which began in England in 1833, the church has remained with only a few minor changes in structure since its construction. All Saints' Chapel, a memorial to Rev. C.W. Hodgson, was built

in 1888. It contains murals by Robert Harris, Canadian painter, and onetime president of the Canadian Academy of Art.

The historical society elected Lorne Callbeck, Charlottetown, as president, with J.H. Morris as secretary and Frank Tunney as treasurer. Lester Linkletter, Summerside is vice-president for Prince County, with F.A.S. Jones, Charlottetown and George Leard, Souris, vice-presidents for Queens and Kings counties respectively.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon outlined projects of the past year in his president's report, and made mention of the museum and archives to be included in the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building.

Rev. Dr. Francis Bolger congratulated Dr. MacKinnon on behalf of the society upon his being chosen "Islander of the Year".

In discussion of new business reference was made to the restoration of Fort Amherst for 1964, and the placing of plaques in memory of historic sites and personages.

The new directors are Mrs. William Brehaut, Dr. Bruce Hodgins, Rev. Francis Bolger and H.L. Palmer.

8 Major Fires Fought In Province In 13 Days

During the last 13 days, Prince Edward Island has had at least eight major fires, which claimed two lives and caused many thousands of dollars damage.

The rash of fires began Feb. 2 when flames destroyed a large potato warehouse at Carleton Place. The building was owned by Paul Laviole and damage was estimated at \$10,000.

The following day firemen fought a fire in a CNR "reefer" car at Tignish in which a large quantity of potatoes was lost.

On Feb. 4 a fire destroyed the two-storey farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Jenkins at Mount Herbert.

During the next three days no outbreaks occurred but on Feb. 8 two homes in Prince County were destroyed claiming the lives of two persons.

The first outbreak occurred in O'Leary when fire destroyed the home of Mrs. Clarence Johnson, resulting in Mrs. Johnson and her daughter, Lottie, losing their lives. Lea Williams was hospitalized as a result of the blaze.

Later in the day the home of

Dr. Orville Phillips, MP was destroyed at Alberton.

Fire struck in the Mount Herbert area Feb. 9, when it levelled a large barn and caused heavy damage to a second one. Two cattle, 24 pigs and a large quantity of hay were lost in the blaze.

On Feb. 10 an outbreak occurred at Winsloe which destroyed the A.B. MacRae feed mill. Grain crushing equipment and a quantity of feed were lost.

Yesterday a family of 13 were left homeless when fire levelled their home at Montrose, near Alberton. Mr. and Mrs. Murray Gulliver and their 11 children lost all their belongings excepting a few pieces of furniture.

Most Roads Reported Open As Gales Subside

Plow operators battled plugged roads yesterday as the province shivered under drifting snow and high winds in the edge of a storm that struck the Atlantic provinces.

The Souris-Charlottetown road was blocked, and plows forced open the road from Montague to the city plugged for some time at Summerside. All Charlottetown equipment was at work through the morning keeping traffic lanes open.

Snowfall during the day amounted to 2.4 inches in Charlottetown, it was reported by the local "met" station, while winds from the north-northwest were at a high of 40 m.p.h., gusting to 55.

The "met" section at RCAF Station Summerside reported a total snowfall of 6.2 inches up until last evening, with a total accumulation of 10 inches on the ground.

Although peak winds reached 54 miles per hour on Sunday evening, and remained high yesterday, they are expected to die down and remain at about 25 miles per hour all day today, with continuing mild squalls.

A combination of heavy walking and driving in Summerside, and incessant snowfall with high winds, resulted in the closing of all schools in the town, but Main Street businesses kept their doors open.

Schools in Charlottetown were closed, as were some government offices. All Maritime Central Airways flights from the island were cancelled, also all scheduled bus trips during the afternoon and evening.

Yesterday morning the IMT office in Charlottetown reported that the bus from Montague arrived one hour and 20 minutes behind schedule, while the bus from Souris turned back at St. Peter's in the face of heavy drifts.

The CNR train dispatcher reported that trains had not encountered much trouble, but that the morning runs for the ferry Abegweit were behind schedule due to ice and poor visibility. A wing plow was used on the train run to Borden and Summerside.

Reports from the government garage about 9 p.m. last night indicated that all main roads were cleared and that most of the plows were in. City Foreman Ralph Crockett reported that work on cleaning and hauling away snow from the business section of the city will begin early in the morning. The crew will later move to the other streets.

Operators in the western part of the island were scheduled to go over the roads at 5:30 this morning to prevent any buildup

On motion of Coun. Palmer, seconded by Coun. McKenna, a donation of \$50 is to be made to the Borden Fire Guides.

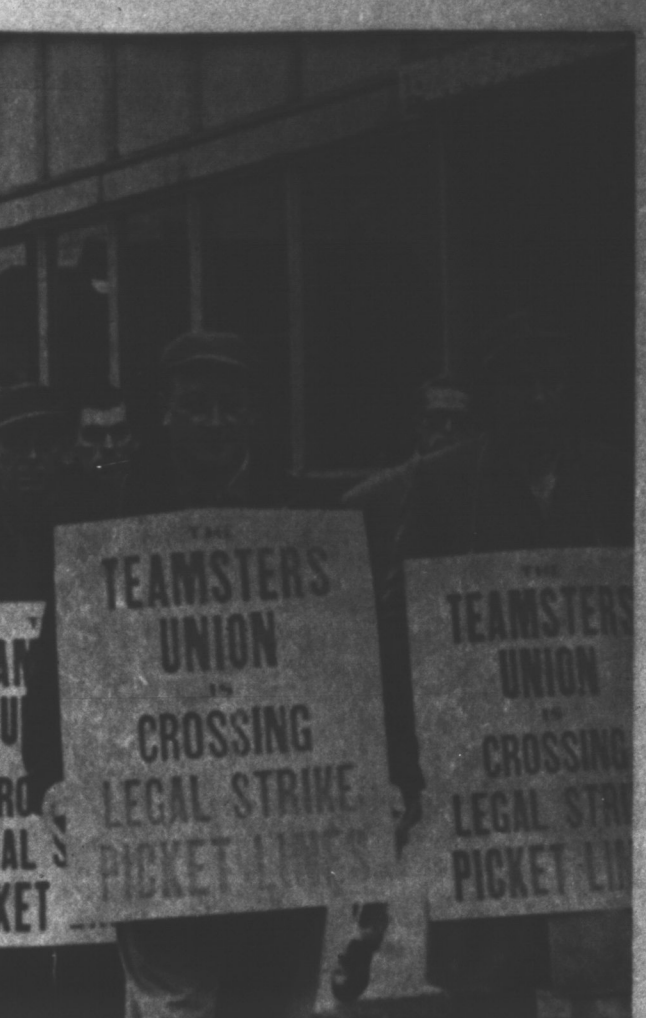
The council discussed renovations of a portion of the town hall which was not used at the present time.

Accident Sequel Sees Driver Fined

SUMMERSIDE — A fine of \$125 and costs was handed out yesterday in Summerside police court by Magistrate S. Hinton, QC, when the accused, Alder E. Gallant, of Central Bedouque, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of driving a motor vehicle while his abilities were impaired by alcohol.

Police Chief Peter White stated that the charge stemmed from an accident on Feb. 11, at the corner of Northumberland and Market Streets, in which damage totaling \$700 was done to both vehicles after the accused reportedly went through a stop sign.

The other car was driven by Offie Gallant, of Summerside, who was accompanied by his wife. She received minor injuries in the collision.

The accused admitted that he had been drinking but said there was no stop sign at the corner when he went through.

William F. MacKinnon, St. Eleanors, was fined \$50 and costs on a charge of having the care and control of a motor vehicle while his abilities were impaired by alcohol.

In fining the accused, who pleaded guilty, Magistrate Hinton noted that this was not a serious offense, as apparently he had sense enough to pull off the road.

Police Chief White explained that the accused was found on Water Street near the Atlantic Wholesale building, sitting in the car with the engine running.

Judgment Given In 3 Cases By Chief Justice Campbell

SUMMERSIDE — Judgment was given yesterday in three civil actions for damages resulting from highway accidents, in Supreme Court at Summerside before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell.

In the first case, that of James Kennedy of Kensington, versus Pauline Bernard and Letus Walsh of Summerside, plaintiff Kennedy received from defendants 75 per cent of damages of \$512.50 or \$384.37, together with 75 per cent of costs, while defendant Bernard will recover against the plaintiff 25 per cent of her damages of \$175 or \$43.75, and 25 per cent of costs.

George R. McMahon was attorney represent Kennedy, while J. Watson MacNaught, QC, represented the defendants.

The case resulted from an accident on the Summerside Road at 8 a.m. on March 6, 1961.

In the second case, judgment was given against defendant, John Winston Clarke of Kensington who was assessed 100 per cent of liability, and plaintiff awarded damages of \$1,972.26 to Charles MacQuarrie; \$300 damages to his wife, Minnie MacQuarrie, and \$300 damages to their infant son, Walter MacQuarrie.

The action resulted from an accident on the Freetown Road.
