**Assembly Addressed
By Rev. Dr. Bonnell**

NEW YORK, May 20 — (OP) — Dr. John Sutherland Bonnell, pastor of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church here, today proposed the establishment of "more exacting standards" for church membership.

Speaking at a preliminary meeting of the 164th annual general assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U. S. A.) Mr. Bonnell, native of Charlottetown, P. E. I., said that without such standards, "we'll only get driftwood." He urged fuller periods of instruction for new church members and organizing prayer groups among them.

Sessions of the general assembly will be held from May 22 through May 28. Some 2,000 Presbyterian leaders, about half clerical and half lay, will attend. Business sessions of the assembly, top governing body of the denomination which, claims about 2,500,000 members, will be held at Mr. Bonnell's church.

Two cars on the regular R.C.M.P. patrol are dealing with the situation on the highways, where all errors are being checked and friendly advice given. PUSAN, Korea, May 21 — (Wednesday) — (AP) — United States soldier-guards stamped out a rebellion Tuesday in a big Pusan prison camp, killing one Communist prisoner and injuring 85 in a battle lasting nearly three hours.
