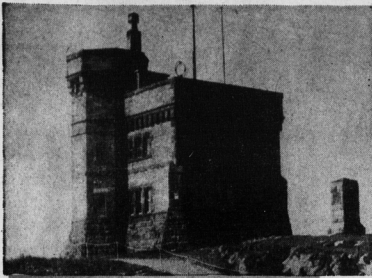

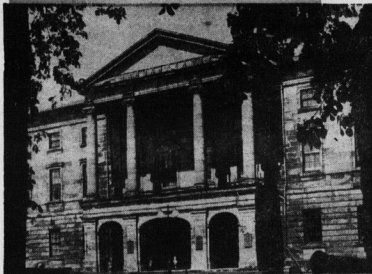

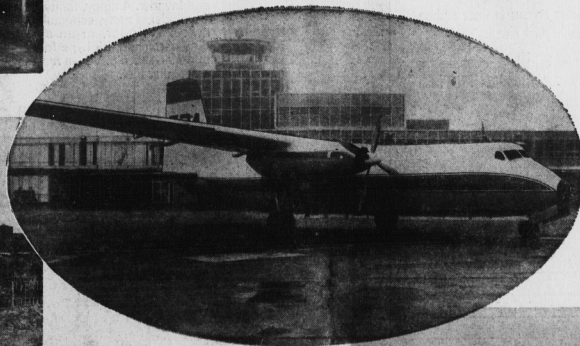

SUMMER TIME HAS LONG RUN

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Summertime ended in Argentina Monday for the first time in 17 years. Clocks were set forward an hour on Sept. 30, 1946, and never set back again because of fuel and power shortages. Now, an official decree says, these reasons have disappeared and clocks will be set back an hour at midnight. That will make Argentine time four hours behind Greenwich Mean Time.

Castro Tells Cubans To Work Harder

HAVANA (AP)—Premier Fidel Castro has told Cubans to start working harder to help the government cut back on aid from the Soviet Union. He termed Soviet aid indispensable but said it saddled Cuba with a \$100,000,000 balance-of-payments deficit.

Speaking here, the Cuban leader cautioned the nation against relying too heavily on assistance from Moscow and said every effort must be made to reverse the trade imbalance with the Russians.

At the same time, Castro renewed personal attacks on President Kennedy, calling him a demagogue more interested in votes than in solving racial problems in the United States. In an impromptu interview Sept. 7, Castro called Kennedy a "cheap and crooked politician."

Castro made it clear Cuba was not ready to go along with any thaw in East-West tensions and vowed to continue to support anti-U.S. revolutions in Latin America.

BLAST INTERRUPTS

At one point during his speech, Castro was interrupted by a mysterious explosion. "Don't worry," he told the crowd. "It doesn't matter if it is a bomb."

Castro appeared at ceremonies marking the third anniversary of the committees for the defence of the revolution.

He said counter-revolutionaries underestimate the force of his revolution in Cuba and claimed more Cuba-type revolutions were in the making in Latin America.

"The only way for Latin America is to follow the Cuban way," he said.

Switching to Cuban foreign policy, Castro said Cuba forms its own international policies and whether it will eventually take such steps as making the limited nuclear test-ban treaty depends on events in the Caribbean.

Terrorism Is Growing In Venezuela

CARACAS (AP)—Communist-backed terrorism in Venezuela grows more violent daily with the approach of a milestone election for a new congress and a successor to President Romulo Betancourt.

The reason, government officials suspect, is that the Communists want to prevent the election scheduled Dec. 1 by provoking a military coup d'etat and a dictatorship which Communists would hope to exploit.

"This city guerrilla war is aimed at shaking the army belief in the ability of a democratic government to maintain law and order," says one Betancourt official. "Venezuelan Communists are jealous of their brothers in power in Cuba and they want to imitate them."

"Fidel" Castro started out against a dictatorship and the Venezuelan Communists want one, too.
