Crown prosecutor Donald Finlayson said the report should not be introduced without the doctor's testimony while Mr. MacKinnon said it could be introduced by Dr. J. Abbas, a Provincial Pathologist who ordered the analysis.

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Takes Exception To Statements Of Education Minister

In the Legislature yesterday, on a question of privilege, Mr. D. L. Mathieson, who had been absent last week due to illness, took exception to statements attributed to the Minister of Education (Hon. F. A. Large) in speaking on the Draft Address on Tuesday last. The Minister was reported as saying that there was nothing brought to light in the Waterworth case to cast reflection upon any member of the House.

An assurance had been given in the House by the Attorney General on March 3 that a Commission would be appointed to inquire into this matter. Mr. Mathieson said. Therefore he submitted that the Minister's action in discussing it was out of order, and was an abuse of the privileges of the House.

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Dr. L. W. Shaw Speaks At Trinity Men's Association

Dr. Lloyd W. Shaw spoke at the meeting of the Men's Association of Trinity United Church last evening on the subject of personality. He referred to the opinion commonly held that personality was something that was born with us and was beyond our power to develop or restrain. With this view the speaker differed; he held that personality could be developed by training and education. It was the sum of the habits which we cultivated and the attitudes which characterized our relationships with those with whom we came in contact. We should endeavour to exercise positive rather than negative relations with other people. Not only individuals but groups of individuals possessed personality. In the case of the group, the personality was the sum of the qualities of the individuals composing it, and therefore we should realize that we were communicating to every group to which we belonged something of the qualities which we ourselves exhibited. In like manner, the group influenced the character of the community; and so the attitudes and characteristics of the individual went out through the power of the influence which he exerted to mould the personality of the community.

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
