Centennial Sight-Seeing Bus Service For Summer

A new departure on the agenda of the Centennial Committee calls for the opening of a sight-seeing bus service in the City on June 15 which is expected to prove popular among visitors during the summer months.

The arrangement calls for a bus to leave the Civic Centre each morning at ten o'clock to be followed by others at half-hour intervals until late evening. As the bus reaches each of the five historic sites in turn, the passengers may drop off and remain as long as they desire, and will be picked up by the next bus to continue their trip over the route of travel.

The historic sites to be visited are: (1) Government House; (2) Fort Edward; (3) P. E. Island Historic Society exhibit at the Y.M.C.A.; (4) Old Parish Cemetery; (5) Confederation Chamber.

At historic Government House, Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse, who is in residence has kindly made it possible for visitors to meet him when opportunity offers.

Here, as at other tour stops, Commissioners will be on hand to give out the necessary information to make the visitors familiar with the history and background of the places designated. At Fort Edward a miniature army museum will be set up where military equipment of the long ago will be on view. The Historic Society Exhibit at the Y.M.C.A., which met a popular demand last year, has been greatly increased in volume and interest in rare articles of great variety.

The old Parish Cemetery on Elm Avenue is of particular interest to those who take note of quaint and unusual stone markings, etc. A splendid job has been done here in straightening old monuments and improving the walks.
