THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND MILK AND CREAM PRODUCERS, CONSUMERS AND DISTRIBUTORS PROTECTIVE ACT

By the Prince Edward Island Milk Control Board on February 19, 1951.

And Approved by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council Pursuant to Section 8 of the said Act on the 22nd day of February, 1951.

Notice is hereby given that on and after the 4th day of March, 1951, the price of fluid milk and cream in the towns of Summerside and Kensington shall be as follows:

Table with columns for Milk (Retail/Wholesale) and Cream (Retail/Wholesale) prices per quart and half quart.

The price of fluid milk to the producer shall be at the rate of \$1.04 per pound butter fat, and the price of fluid cream shall be at the rate of 86c per pound butter fat.
