

"Sugar Chile" Is Ambitious To Be Dr. Frank Robinson

OLIVET, Mich. (AP) — His schoolmates at Olivet College know him as Frank Isaac Robinson—a little fellow with an engaging grin who wants to be a doctor.

Others remember him better as "Shugg," the famous Sugar Chile Robinson—a boogie-woogie, piano-playing, scat-singing child prodigy. These days, a 17-year-old Negro pre-med student, he is happy with an occasional jam session with schoolmates.

"Sugar Chile is gone," says Frank. "I want to come back as Dr. Frank Robinson."

He stands an excellent chance of accomplishing his goal. A modest, alert youth, he appears to have profited from all the advantages of fame without succumbing to its drawbacks.

Sugar Chile could read at 2. At 6 he was an accomplished, if unorthodox pianist. Besides his talent he had a natural charm.

HIT AT SIX

Name musicians of the immediate post-war years remember the amazing Sugar Chile who at 6 was banging out barrelhouse jazz in some of the classiest gin mills and vaudeville circuits in the United States, Canada and Europe.

Before he retired at 15 he made \$10,000 a week. He played in Madison Square Garden, Toronto and Montreal, and appeared before President Truman in Washington and the Royal Family in London. He was in movies, musical comedies and on television. Recalling playing for Truman, Frank says:

"I was playing like everything. Then something happened that I'll never forget. I shouted, 'How'm I doin', Mr. President?' And just then one of the piano legs broke.

By then he had decided on a college education.

He had a diploma, an interest in medicine and \$100,000 in a trust fund under court supervision.

"I've always wanted to be a doctor," Frank says. "I'm lucky that I will have the money to get the education I'll need."

Scouts' Pules Return To Normal After Royal Visit

SUTTON PARK, England (CP) Boy scouts' pulses returned to normal Sunday following the excitement of a five-hour royal visit to this world jubilee camp.

The official camp program was headed "quiet day" with the only formal events being scores of church services in almost every known denomination.

The relaxed atmosphere was in sharp contrast to the tension of Saturday's action-packed program, that also featured a colorful demonstration by the 1,500-strong Canadian contingent.

The centre of attraction Sunday were 94 scouts, one from each country at the jamboree, who were presented to the Queen at a royal tea party midway through the tour.

The Canadians, whose emerald

green tents are scattered over five sub camps, almost caused a traffic jam as they streamed into the section occupied by Jimmy Churchill of Foxboro, Ont., to hear the 15-year-old Queen's scout give a first-hand account of his meeting with the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh and his impressions of the royal tea party.

QUEEN BEAUTIFUL

The slim, wiry youngster, who earned \$400 doing odd jobs in the Ontario village to help pay his way to the jamboree, described the Queen as "more beautiful than I ever imagined possible."

A question sometimes raised is how a 6-5 distribution can be shown. Where the six-card suit is lower in rank than the five-card suit, there is a standard procedure by which the 6-5 distribution can be identified.

In the bidding sequence given, South's three spade bid is the key to his 6-5 distribution. At the point the two spade bid is made, North has every right to assume South has only a four-card suit, since it is being named secondarily.

When South bids three spades, however, this assumption becomes invalid. It would not make much sense for South to rebid a four-
