Multi-Million Dollar Power Project Opened

By Bob Joyce Canadian Press Staff Writer BAE COMEAU, Que. (CP) - A \$15,000,000 power development, built on Quebec's turbulent Manicouagan river to serve American-owned newsprint mills was officially opened Saturday by Premier Duplessis.

Touching a button engraved with a fleur-de-lis, Mr. Duplessis set in motion two generators of the 96,000 horsepower project, built by a subsidiary company of the Chicago Tribune. The development will supply power to the Tribune's newsprint mills in this industrial town on the north shore of the St. Lawrence river about 220 miles northeast of Quebec.

In a brief address at the inaugural ceremony, Mr. Duplessis called for close co-operation between his government and United States capital. "Anyone who asserts Quebec does not want United States Capital does not know what he is talking about," said Mr. Duplessis. Turning to Col. Robert R. McCormick, president of the Chicago Tribune Company, and guests at the ceremony the premier added: "We have the resources. You have the money. Quebec has the best government. Let us work together."

He praised Col. McCormick for his contributions to the development of Quebec's resources. Arthur Schmon president of the Manicouagan Power Company and chief of Chicago Tribune subsidiaries in Canada, said Premier Duplessis had "lent a more than sympathetic ear" to plans for St. Lawrence north shore development by private enterprise. "Today's ceremony represents the turning of another key to unlock the natural resources of Quebec," said Mr. Schmon. "This project is an asset not only to the company, but to the entire district, the province and the country."

Col. McCormick, whose name was given to the new plant, spoke briefly in French. The project, started in 1951 was blessed by Msgr. Napoleon Labrie, Roman Catholic Bishop of the St. Lawrence gulf diocese.

Haida Nears Home After Seven Months Off Korea

OTTAWA, (CP) - The Tribal destroyer Haida will arrive at her home port of Halifax Wednesday after a seven-month-long patrol of Korean waters, the navy announced Sunday. She is under the command of Cmdr. Dunn Lantier of Montreal.

During her patrol Haida blasted North Korean factories and shore installations and destroyed three trains. She emerged unscathed from the fire of enemy shore batteries. Less spectacularly, she patrolled friendly islands off the Korean coast and joined in the escort of aircraft carriers.

The navy said that on her arrival at Halifax Wednesday, Haida will become the second Canadian destroyer to have sailed around the world. She left Japan a month ago to return to Canada by way of Hong Kong, Singapore, Colombo, Aden, Suez, Malta Gibraltar and the Azores, retracing last year's homecoming journey of HMCS Nooka.

Haida was relieved in mid-June by another Halifax-based destroyer, HMCS Huron, under the command of Cmdr. Richard Chenoweth of Westmount, Que. Huron, reported at the beginning of last week to have been damaged in a grounding off the North Korean coast, was scheduled to arrive during the week-end at Sasebo, Japan, for repairs. She was reported to have crushed part of the forward section of her hull be-

low the water-line. There were no casualties. During her seven months off Korea, Haida spent a total of 145 days on actual patrol, steaming some 40,000 miles in enemy waters. This involved oiling at sea 34 times and transferring supplies 67 occasions.

Six of her nine patrols were carried out on the west coast of Korea under British command. The other patrols were off the north-east coast of Korea under American command. The patrols were 10 to 21 days in duration. The destroyer's main armament and close-range weapons fired a total of 3,500 rounds in the Korean war theatre.

Haida bagged her first train on a patrol last December during which she also bombarded a North Korean factory and marshalling yard. On the December patrol an enemy shell fell 200 yards off the ship starboard but Haida altered course and increased speed before the enemy guns could correct their aim.

The two other train successes occurred during the ship's last Korean patrol which ended June 9. There are now two Canadian destroyers in Korean waters: Athabasca and Iroquois. Iroquois replaced HMCS Crusader which returned home recently with a score of 3 1-2 Communist trains destroyed.
