Local and Other Items.

A SNAKE STORY.—A Picton paper tells of a man living not far from that town who recently killed a snake that was three feet long. In doing so he brought to life 34 young ones, all of which were disposed of.

RELICS UNKARIED.—Messrs. McKinlay, while excavating a cellar for their new house at Red Bank Northumberland Co., N. B., exhumed parts of two skeletons, stone hatchets, axes, spears and other instruments of Indian warfare, which, no doubt, had been buried there some time by the survivors of a battle between the tribes. They were wrapped in birch bark, which was perfectly sound.

PLUM TREES DYING.—Nearly every plum orchard in the country was affected by a mysterious blight last winter, and hundreds of well grown and apparently thrifty trees died. The Dominion horticultural experts should be called upon to diagnose the case and determine the character of the new disease, which, if its ravages continue, will soon destroy the plum orchards of the valley.—Bridgetown Monitor.

A BLIND PRODIGY.—Kokomo, Ind., has a blind prodigy who took his cottage organ to the court house square, tore it down and put it together in three hours. The organ contains 295 pieces, including keys and reeds. After he reconstructed the organ he played upon it. Not long ago the town clock in the city hall tower got out of order and the blind man climbed to the clock, 185 feet, and repaired it. His name is William Brinkman.

MEXICAN LOCOMOTIVES.—Travellers over the line of railway from the city of Mexico to the city of Vera Cruz are said to be greatly impressed with some of the engines they see on that route—double headers as they are termed. The Mexican Railway Company has already as many as a dozen, adding them from time to time to its stock as business has demanded. Each of the men-mouth constructions weighs 100 tons, and is capable of hauling 190 tons up a four and one half per cent grade. They are of Scotch manufacture, built by the Fairlie Company of Glasgow, and have now been in the service of the road about ten years. The fact is mentioned as somewhat singular that these double headers are used by no other road in North America.

THROUGH AN OPEN SWITCH.

Wrecked by Tramps — Passengers and Employes Killed.

FULTON, N. Y., Sept. 2.—Train No. 5 on the New York, Ontario and West railway, known as "The Chicago Limited," was wrecked at Ingalls Crossing, four miles south of this village, at 5 o'clock yesterday morning. The wreck was doubtless due to the dastardly work of tramps, who threw open the switch at which the train was wrecked, as well as two switches to the north of the wreck. The train was an hour and a quarter late and running nearly sixty miles an hour when it struck the switch and was thrown over to the side track. The rapid speed made it impossible to make a sharp turn and the train left the track when it struck the safety rail.

The engine was thrown twenty feet and blown to pieces. The tender was inverted. The trucks of the baggage car was thrown off and the head coach telescoped the baggage car. A vestibule chair car and the sleeper Farragut were derailed, but neither was badly damaged. Twenty train hands and passengers were killed. Engineer Dowd and his fireman, Hall, both jumped and were found under the wreckage of the tender by passengers from the sleeper. Both were alive at the time, but Dowd died in a few minutes and Hall succumbed to injuries at 8 o'clock. The body of brakeman Osborne was torn in two.

Robbers Get Six Thousand

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 1.—Robbers secured six thousand dollars in cash from the Pacific Express Company in this city yesterday. The money was consigned by the First National Bank of Omaha to the Citizens' National Bank of St. Paul. It was in a small iron safe in the delivery wagon of the express office, and in the custody of George Archibald, driver, who had started toward the depot. En route Archibald stopped at several wholesale houses for other packages. He drove down an alley and went in for a package of jewelry at the shopping door of a jewelry house. When he came out the door of the safe was standing open and but one package was removed. This one contained \$6000 in bills. The driver reported the matter and was at once arrested.

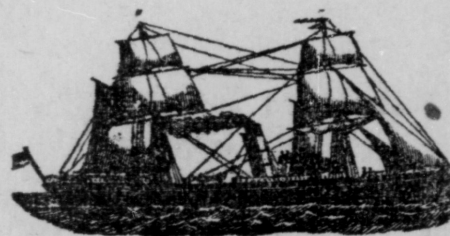
