Students are required to make five jumps from an airplane in flight, including one with full equipment. The airborne course is but one of 21 at the Infantry School open to officers and enlisted men of the Regular Army, Organized Reserve and National Guard. Courses range from training recruits to become parachutists to training regimental commanders and division general staff officers.
