

Annual Meeting Diocesan Board Of W. A. Concludes

PEI Fishermen's Ass'n Business Meeting Held

A resolution suggesting to the Federal Government that provision be made for helpers and crews of fishing boats through unemployment insurance was passed at the annual business meeting of the P. E. Island Fishermen's Association which followed the luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

The metal trap on exhibit was examined in detail and discussed freely by many of the fishermen who bombarded Mr. Eugene Gorman with questions as to cost and the result of experiments made elsewhere. No action was taken as to experiments here but the matter will receive further consideration.

Other matters discussed included fish inspection, central marketing promotion work and the need of advertising, extension work among the fishermen of the province with a view to presenting an unbroken front to the advancement of the fishermen's objectives.

A resolution of appreciation for publicly given by the press and radio was also passed.

Mr. Phillip Jamieson of Sturgeon was elected a director from King's County and Mr. John Duncane, Tignish, director from Prince County. The election of officers will take place at a later date.

Preparing For Fat Stock Show

A culling committee composed of Messrs. L. W. Roper, W. R. Shaw, A. H. Roberts along with a representative from Swift Canadian Co. and Canada Packers Ltd. will have a difficult time culling what is reported to be the largest entry list in the four years that the annual Fat Stock Show and Sale has been held in Charlottetown.

Judging the cattle again this year will be Mr. Frank Wolff, agricultural agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway. All the foremost beef breeds in the Province and their crosses will be eligible for entry in the show.

Increased interest has been shown in this agricultural event every year and it is expected that the competition among the breeders and bidders will reach an all time high.

The top price of 99 cents per lb. paid last year was for Red-vein Stewart's Aberdeen Angus steer and an average price for the sale was 28 1/2 cents which was a record for Canada. Judging begins tomorrow at 1:00 p.m. and the sale starts on Friday at the same hour. The show and sale will be at the Exhibition Grounds.

Previous to his appointment the new liaison officer was Staff Gunner Officer in the Atlantic Command of the R. C. N. He is accompanied by his wife and two daughters and will be living at Paget.

The appointment was made because during the next five months Canadian naval vessels will be going to Bermuda for anti-submarine exercises.
