## Smart Lobsters, Cars Seized At Kidare

ALBERTON — Four West Prince lobster fishermen were charged before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald yesterday, with possession of large quantities of undersized lobsters and all cases were adjourned to a later date.

Gerard B. Gillis of Kidare Central pleaded guilty to possession of 1,225 lobsters measuring less than two and a half inches carapace contrary to Section 3B of the Fishery Regulations and with aiding in committing the offense a 1960 Monoran sedan. The case was adjourned until June 27.

Victor Roy Rayner, Kidare Central, pleaded not guilty to possession of 419 undersized lobsters and the case was adjourned for trial on July 11.

He was apparently seized with a truck in the course of his farm duties. He passed away before near-by members of the family could reach him.

Noted for his industry and integrity, he had operated the family farm from boyhood, his father, James Montgomery having passed away in early life.
