VIOLENT GALE.

About one o'clock on Saturday morning a gale of unusual severity commenced in this locality, and continued until daylight with unabated violence. The damage occasioned in the city and suburbs was considerable, and some of the shipping in the harbor suffered from the effects of the gale.

The schooner Jane, Campbell, master, from Gloucester Bay bound to this port, is a total loss at Lawrencetown. The captain and crew with difficulty escaped with their lives.

GOSSIP ABOUT WRITERS.

WILLIAM CULLEN BRYANT.

Mr. Bryant, now seventy-three years old, furnishes an example of serene and beautiful old age which stands almost without a parallel among the men with whose names the reading world is familiar.

During the poetical history of Mr. Bryant, we find ourselves taken back almost to the cradle. It is not asserted that his first utterances were in rhyme, nor that lullaby to which his cradle was rocked was sung to his own words.

Dr. Peter Bryant, William's father, was a man of strong literary taste and fine scholarship. He hailed with delight these exhibitions of genius in his boy, and entered into his pursuits with genuine enthusiasm.

His precocity thus carefully directed, it was none the less care fully encouraged. When the lad was but fourteen, he composed a poem of considerable character, entitled, "The Embargo, or Sketches of the Times."

At the age of sixteen, young Bryant entered William's College, where he remained two years; and then, on his own application, received an honorable dismissal.

we could ascertain just how many times the critical pen has said, in effect, "If Mr. Bryant had never written another line, his position as a poet would be made unquestionable for all time by this single effort of his muse."

From this time forward, Mr. Bryant's career was definitely marked out. Though he took too high rank as a lawyer in his native State, he loved letters more than law, and soon relinquished practice entirely.

The world is most familiar with Mr. Bryant's prose writings, through the editorial columns of the Evening Post. He has a few equals in the newspaper press as a writer of elegant and correct English.

Mr. Bryant has travelled extensively in foreign lands, and is now abroad—as any one who reads the Evening Post can easily perceive. He is well acquainted with the French, Italian, German and Spanish languages.

When at home, Mr. Bryant lives in summer, at a beautiful place near Roslyn, L. I., although he has recently been completing a tasteful country home at Cummington, his native place.

In his domestic relations, Mr. Bryant's life has again been marked by the loveliest serenity. No man was ever more devotedly attached to the wife with whom he lived so many years.

In his personal appearance Mr. Bryant is quite impressive, with his fine gray beard and hair, his large and symmetrical head, with his high, broad forehead and kindly eyes, and his erect figure.
