TO-MORROW.—A Pontifical High Mass, de Sancta Trinitate, commemorative of the discovery of America by Columbus, will be celebrated in St. Dunstan's Cathedral to-morrow forenoon at ten o'clock. His Lordship Bishop Macdonald will be the celebrant. The sermon of the day will be preached by the Rev. Dr. Morrison, Rector of St. Dunstan's College.

A Roman Mass will be celebrated in all the other Roman Catholic churches throughout the diocese on the same day.

STAMP COLLECTION.—The Halifax Herald says: Probably one of the most curious exhibits at the World's Fair will be the stamp collection of E. J. H. Pauley, of this city. It has taken Mr. Pauley fully four years to gather up the stamps in the collection. They are from all parts of the globe. The World's Fair exhibit which he despatched yesterday comprises a complete set of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island stamps, also some very old Canadian issues. The collection is valued at \$5,000, but is not for sale.

THE TURK.—Posters are out advertising races on the Moncton Driving Park, Thurs. day, Oct. 21st. The events consist of a three mile, a 2 1/2 and a running race. The purses offered are \$75, \$100 and \$25 respectively.

The brown stallion Edgardo, owned by W. F. Todd, of St. Stephen, was one of the right entries in the 2 1/2 mile class at Mystic Park, Boston, on the 13th. Edgardo was the best of his class with one exception, a Boston horse, which took first money, \$500. In the first heat Edgardo started last and easily crept by everything and came in first. In the remaining three heats he came in second.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. NEW BRUNSWICK POLITICS.

A Glance at the Field.

St. JOHN, Oct. 15. To-day is nomination day for the local legislature. Full tickets on each side are to run in St. John city, St. John County, King's, Westmorland, Kent, Restigouche, Queen's, Charlotte, Carleton, and Victoria. Theriault, independent, will be elected by acclamation in Madawaska, which only returned one member. In Gloucester the Government ticket of two is opposed by an independent ticket. In Northumberland there is only one Opposition member for four seats. In Albert, which returns two, there is one candidate on each side and a third who is claimed by both. In York, which returns four members, the Opposition ticket is one man short, but H. H. Pitts is running on an Opposition ticket of his own as the nominee of the temperance and Orange orders. In Sunbury, the only remaining constituency which returns two members, the Opposition have two candidates, but the Government has only one. In Carleton Blair caused his Government ticket to be withdrawn yesterday, and made a new one composed of H. A. Connell and Allen Dibblee. An Opposition convention in Queen's yesterday selected Hon. Frank Woods and L. Pearson for candidates.

The Tunnel Borings.

Ottawa, Oct. 15. The statements made by Grit P. E. Island papers that boring operations on the Straits of Northumberland have ceased without substantial progress being made are incorrect. The land borings on the New Brunswick side, and submarine borings for two miles into the channel have been completed with apparently successful results—shale and sandstone formation being found continuous. The suspension of operations was owing to the close of the season only.

Net Debt Decreasing.

Ottawa, Oct. 15. The net debt has decreased nearly \$2,500,000 during the first quarter of the present fiscal year. This fact is made more impressive notwithstanding the increase of expenditures on capital account amounting to \$500,000, as compared with the corresponding quarter of last year. This increase is principally due to the energetic manner in which the Sault Marie canal is being pushed forward.

A Valuable Estate.

St. JOHN, Oct. 15. The estate of Vincent White, provision merchant, is valued at \$100,000 per-sonal. The deceased leaves an income of \$4,000 to his widow for her lifetime, and a small sum to a sister, \$2,000 to the home for aged females, and \$2,000 to the Protestant orphan asylum. The balance goes to his son, Dr. White.

An Outpost Captured.

Paris, Oct. 15. Col. Dodds, commander of French forces operating against the King of Dahomey, telegraphs that his expedition carried a strongly entrenched outpost six miles from Cans on Wednesday, and the French lost 28 killed and wounded.

Arrested for Embezzlement.

St. JOHN, Oct. 15. Gilbert Robinson is in custody charged with embezzling the funds of the St. John Gas Light Co.

Thanksgiving Day.

Ottawa, Oct. 15. A proclamation appointing November 10th as Thanksgiving day has been issued.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—The thirteenth company of the army service corps, stationed at Portsmouth, as a protest against alleged unnecessary drills, last night cut the harness belonging to their horses, rendering them worthless. Inquiry is being made into the cause.

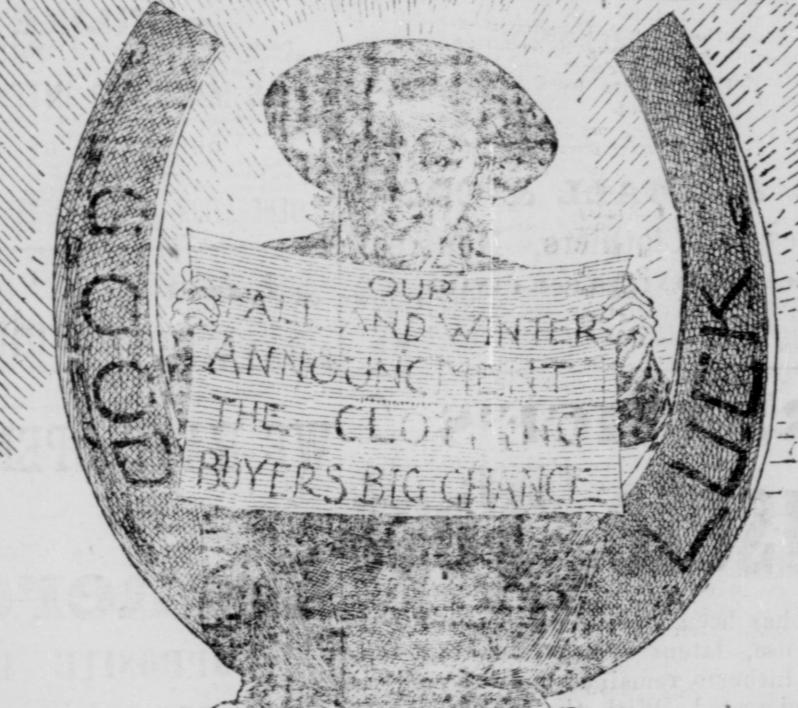
ROUSE'S POINT, N. Y., Oct. 13.—The Canadian barge A. Gravel, from Sorel to Albany, loaded with lumber, was seized here to-day, and twelve Chinamen were found in the hold, all of whom with the captain were lodged in jail. Some Canadians were getting fifty dollars a head for the deal.

MONTREAL, Oct. 13.—At the meeting of the C. M. B. A. to-day the Canadians gained their point, and hereafter the supreme council of Canada will have entire control of the Canadian benefits. The election of officers took place, and the only change was the replacing of E. J. O'Brien, of Guelph, by Rev. M. J. Keay, of New York, on the supreme board of trustees.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—A special despatch to the Times from Calcutta says that trouble has broken out again with the Chins in northern Chin hills. In May last it was announced that Chin hills had been brought under the direct control of British officers. The natives have been restless under their administration, and have now broken out in revolt. The Times' correspondent says that a party of Chins ambushed themselves six miles from Fort White and fired upon the escort of a number of native officers, killing 17. A small force was sent to search for the bodies for the purpose of burying them. They found the Chins had deserted their village and were lying in ambush two miles from Fort White. The British force advanced cautiously and succeeded in routing the Chins from their hiding place. They made a stand a little farther on. A skirmish was in progress at the time of sending the despatch. Reinforcements for the British were despatched from Mandalay.
