

# Enthusiasts Here Among The First In Amateur Radio

Enthusiasts in Charlottetown were among the first in this country to play an active role in developing amateur radio, and the greatest disaster of its time helped further to stimulate interest in this type of communication which was then in its infancy. This was learned yesterday from Walter Hyndman who became actively interested at an early age and who built the first radio broadcasting station in this province.

There were a number of amateur radio enthusiasts here in the early days. They included the late Keith Rogers — it is the Keith Rogers Memorial Radio Club that is host to the Maritime Convention A.R.R.L. opening here today — Ronnie Stewart, Ernie Auld, and Ernest Weeks, later Major-General Weeks who became Vice Chief of the General Staff at Ottawa, Harold Pickard was another of the enthusiasts of the early days.

Mr. Pickard recalled yesterday that his first receiving set consisted of two safety razor blades with a piece of lead pencil fastened across them. A telephone car piece was used to listen to incoming messages. He had no transmitter at the time. That was prior to the First Great War.

The Titanic was sunk on her maiden voyage when she rammed an iceberg while travelling at full speed. At that time she was the largest ship afloat. There were 2,224 people on board and 1,513 of them were lost.

# City Schools Will Open With Two Still Overcrowded

Nine o'clock Tuesday writes finis to the summer holiday season for hundreds of children living within the area administered by the Charlottetown School Board.

In all five seats of learning (throw wide their portals Tuesday morning: Queen Charlotte High, Queen Square, West Kent, Rochford Square and Prince Street. The new Charlottetown High School on Longworth Avenue is not expected to be ready for occupancy until early in 1958.

The opening of the new school is expected to relieve the serious overcrowding conditions in both Queen Square and Rochford Square Schools. In the meantime the overflow will be accommodated in classrooms set up in the Community Center on Stewart Street and in the auditorium at Queen Square.

Expected registration in these two schools will require that at least eleven classes will have to be taught in temporary quarters, Mr. K.A. Parker, Superintendent of City Schools indicated.

That was a commercial proposition but there was an understandable development of interest in wireless telephony among the amateurs and Mr. Hyndman was the first man in the province to develop a wireless telephone set here. He was also well among the first in the Maritimes and even in Canada, it was stated by another source.

Mr. Parker also stated that there was no shortage of teachers to fill the staffs of the City schools.

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# U.S. Army Pushes Work On Jupiter

WASHINGTON (AP)—The now-established fact that the Russians have launched at least four long-range ballistic missiles has spurred a new U.S. Army drive to put its shorter-ranged but tested Jupiter weapon into production immediately.

The U.S. Air Force has made one attempt to launch an intercontinental ballistic missile. That attempt, early this summer, ended abruptly after an Atlas weapon rose about 6,000 feet then destroyed itself after the failure of a small valve caused heavy rocket-powered vehicle to lose its balance and wobble in the air.

The USAF is known to have a second Atlas nearly ready for the launching. Were it not for the defence department ban on official talk about new missiles, the army would say today that it is ready to place Jupiter into production within 30 days.

The army has tested every phase of the Jupiter and believes that it has eliminated the bugs which cause some earlier launching failures. Wednesday, a Jupiter, complete in every detail except the nose cone, travelled more than 400 miles high and exactly 1,500 miles out over the Atlantic.
