

Fish And Game Problems Are Discussed At S'side Meeting

Presiding at the first monthly meeting of year since the annual meeting of the Prince County Branch of the Fish and Game Association expressed to the members his appreciation of the honor they had conferred on him in electing him as president and said that he would do all in his power to fill the office to the satisfaction of the members. He asked for the co-operation of the members in assisting him during the coming year.

The minutes of the Prince Edward Island provincial executive meeting which was held in Charlottetown were read and out of these minutes a discussion arose regarding the appointment of game wardens for the three counties. Some arguments were expressed in favor of the appointment of a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for this work. It was moved, however, that the recommendation from this branch be that the present system of having a game warden from each county be maintained. The motion was carried unanimously.

Some discussion was held regarding the matter of improving fishing conditions in the Dunk River. The president stated that Mr. Lowell Hancock had tentative plans in this regard and it was decided that a full discussion on the matter be left over until the next meeting.

The president pointed out that it was necessary to make two appointments from the provincial executive from the branch to act on a committee charged with writing the Fish and Game Act, one man for the game laws and one for fishing. The meeting appointed Morley M. Bell and B.I. Rayner to act on the committee.

Considerable discussion took place regarding the advisability of having a closed season on Hungarian partridge. While some of the members were definitely in favor of such a closed season others were not in favor of it. It was agreed that because there were not enough members present who were Hungarian partridge hunters that it be left over until the next meeting and that the secretary advise the general membership that this matter would be on the agenda at the next regular meeting.

President Howatt brought before the meeting the matter of the serious food conditions for black ducks. He pointed out that due to the severe weather conditions these birds were up against in food and he impressed on the members that feed was available and that any farmers in the county who knew of flocks in need of feed that they contact any member of the Fish and Game Association and a supply would be sent to their locality for this purpose.

The following members were appointed to the bird committee: Claude Harkness, chairman, Austin Campbell and Trueman, Claude Harkness and the secretary, Earl Hayes, were appointed to act on the entertainment committee.

Efficient Harvesting of Scallops and Quahaugs

23. That offshore fisheries be regulated in accordance with ICN-FAF recommendations.

24. That the fishery regulations applicable to Prince Edward Island be reviewed, with the object of retaining only the essential ones, which can be effectively enforced.

25. That the degree of protection given to inshore fishermen against interference of larger vessels be increased by the provision of better safeguards.

26. That effective arrangements be made for inspection of smelt runs and the removal of obstacles and for the opening up or creating fresh spawning areas.

27. That experiments and demonstrations be conducted to introduce the most appropriate species of trout and the best methods of raising them for commercial sale.

28. That the effects of pollution on fish populations be investigated; the cost of reducing it estimated, and the programme for its reduction be implemented if necessary through legislation.

29. That the Fishermen's Loan Board continue and that it pay due attention to the well-balanced development of the fisheries of the Island.

30. That in the administration of financial aid the widest scope be given to the development of vessels and gear best adapted to the circumstances of our fisheries.

31. That continuing studies of vessels and gear be conducted and results made available promptly.

32. That financial assistance be confined to bona fide fishermen and to vessels which are beyond their financial means, but can be effectively operated by them.

33. That financial grants may be made available for all types of fishing vessels whose cost of construction comes within specified limits and which meet the requirements of the administering authority.

34. That the grants in respect of vessels be expressed as a proportion of the cost of a vessel irrespective of its tonnage.

35. That a strong committee be set up comprising Federal and Provincial agencies concerned to prepare a plan for the maintenance and improvement of existing harbours and the construction of new works where necessary.

36. That the above committee prepare specific recommendations of improvements to meet immediate needs.

37. That the eastern entrance to Rustico Bay be closed in order to improve the western entrance for the use of fishing boats.

38. That the development of groundfish operations at Alberton be undertaken with the assistance of Federal and Provincial authorities.

39. That bait holding units be established at strategic points.

40. That policies which would increase or artificially maintain present number of lobster canneries be avoided.

41. That appropriate Provincial legislation be put into effect without unnecessary delay to enable use of Federal and Provincial authority in inspection of plants and products.

42. That special attention be paid to the need for an active programme of training in all matters relative to quality control in processing plants.

43. That inspection of fishery products to enforce satisfactory standards be carried out thoroughly.

44. That grading according to fixed standards be compulsory with the support of processors and consumers.

45. That further study be made in order to establish a stronger marketing organization.

46. That a comprehensive programme of education on fisheries subjects to include education of the general public as well as to provide vocational courses for fishermen be initiated.

47. That the Province employ a properly qualified educationalist in this field.

48. That a continuing committee under the auspices of the two Governments be established to advise on the implementation of the development programme and to make further recommendations.

clam stacks noted last summer, it was suggested that P.E.I. be included in clam investigations.

9. That the development of harvesting equipment for Irish Moss be further studied.

10. That research and experimentation be continued to increase efficiency and reduce costs of P.E.I.'s oyster industry, including the possible development of new suitable areas of production.

11. That further investigations be undertaken to reduce costs and losses in the lobster industry, by the operations of pounds, and that research work be carried out on freezing, cold storage, and transportation.

12. That further experimentation and research be undertaken to improve the groundfish filleting industry.

13. That further research be undertaken into the processing, storage, and transportation of herring and mackerel and their products in view of the large stocks of these fish available in the nearby Gulf of St. Lawrence.

14. That effective and economic means of processing crabs be developed.

15. That improved methods of canning silverides be investigated.

16. That steps be taken to improve enforcement of size limit in the lobster fishery.

17. That minimum lath space regulations for lobster traps be strictly enforced.

18. That a single uniform open season for lobster fishing about May and June be established throughout the southern Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Northumberland Straits.

19. That all restrictions on areas in which a fisherman may find lobster, or in which any fishery equipment may be used during the open season be removed.

20. That consideration be given to some measure of relief for those specially affected by the temporary unfavourable effects of a change in lobster seasons.

21. That the memorandum on Appendix B-8 be fully studied and discussed with a view to initiating experiments along the lines suggested. (This appendix deals with "Special Problems of the Lobster Fishery" and was compiled by F.E. Popper, Dom. Dept. of Fisheries.)
