Art Centre Focal Point For Children's Activities

The Children's Art Centre in the Market Building in Charlottetown is the focal point of a movement which, unknown to many, reaches out to children, and to a more limited extent to adults, all over the Province.

Upon the organization of the Art Centre in 1948 Miss Frances Johnston was appointed director, and the following year the members were formed into a sponsoring body, the P. E. I. Arts and Crafts Guild.

Of the day and a half equivalent she spends at the Art Centre each week, a considerable part is spent in children's art classes, three on weekdays after school which are attended by youngsters from six to fourteen, and a three hour open house session Saturday mornings is attended by children in large number from walking age up.

The teachers in attendance were from the four Charlottetown public schools: West Kent, Queen Square, Prince Street and Rockford Square. Included in the special guests invited were Premier J. Walter Jones, Minister of Education, and Mrs. Jones, the Deputy Minister of Education, Dr. Lloyd W. Shaw, and Mrs. Shaw, and City Councillor Edwin C. Johnstone representing the Mayor, and Mrs. Johnstone.

Something New At the art centre there is always something to see, because the exhibits are kept on the move. Material from many sources within and without the Province is utilized, and exhibits have included a wide variety of forms of art.

Miss Johnston came to Charlottetown from a post at the Public Library and Art Museum in London, Ont., to become director of the Art Centre.
