



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Among the daughters of Playdale 2041 that will be trained the coming season is Norma Britton, whose dam is Holly Britton, by Great Britton, grandam, Miss Hollywood Volo - breeding equal to the best. She was purchased last spring from Ralph Gay, Winsloe, by Lorne E. Britton, Hartland, N.B., who is one of the most enthusiastic horsemen in the Maritimes. In a recent letter from Mr. Britton we learn that Frankie Carr has his headquarters in Hartland this winter and is giving daily exercise to seven prospects in his stable. Hollywood Anna 3, 2071, a brown mare by Hollywood Hermes, eligible to the 218 trot, Betty Ellis 217, brown mare by Royal Napoleon 2,060, eligible to the 222 pace. Sailor Hanover and Hero's Child, all belonging to W. B. Nevers, and the pacer Connie Clegg 216, by Abner T. Clegg 2041, eligible to the 220 class, the pacer Laurel Lee 216, by Laurel Hanover, eligible to the 223 pace, also the above mentioned Playdale mare for Lorne E. Britton. Frankie is ably assisted by Norman MacDonald of Woodstock.

Among the new horses that will be trained over Truro Raceway is Jimmie Clegg, by Abner T. Clegg, whose birth place was on Prince Edward Island. His new owner is Fraser McGregor of Truro, and the Clegg horse is at present in the table of Frankie Daniels at Lawrencetown, N.S.

When women get interested in races they are rarely satisfied with one, and that goes for Mrs. Emma Mustacalis, who resides at Bible Hill, near the Truro Raceway. Last year she was joint owner with Frank Daniels of the pacer Chief A.C. 2105, that came down last winter and topped the ice racing event at the International Ice Meet near Moncton. Since then Chief A.C. has been raced through the season at Truro and on the Commons at Halifax. This season he starts at eligible to the 217 pace. For his owners last year he did pretty well, picking up \$1,151.25 and being first to wire six times, eight times second and six times third. And now we learn that Mrs. Mustacalis has purchased two more pacers, one the year-year-old Real Fingo by Calumet Fingo 2041, that Frank McInduff saw worked an easy mile to 2:12 before being brought down from Maine last fall to Kensington by Myron MacArthur. We have no particulars of the other purchase. We trust Mrs. Mustacalis will have the best of racing luck in 1952.

The following appeared in Aubrey Keltzer's sport column in the Sydney Post-Record recently - More Cape Breton horses are headed for "greener pastures" according to a reliable source. Word yesterday was that P. J. Cadogan's stable from Glace Bay was heading for Foxboro, Mass. and would be starting there sometime next month. At the same time it was learned that the popular Sydney River driver, Ronnie MacDonald, was headed for the same centre with Ernie Smith's Great Doon, Munroe and LeVette's June B. and Charlie Sutherland's Hirsch stable will move to New Glasgow for training under George Mauger. Truro feels that if the Sydney Sports Centre fails to open, a number of the Cape Breton horses will campaign there during the season.

Leo C. McNamara of Two Gait Farm, Indianapolis, Indiana, pulled the biggest surprise that has hit the Standardbred breeding ranks in the United States since the importation of Messenger, by announcing that he has purchased the French trotting stallion Quel Veinard. It marks the first time in harness racing history that a stallion has been imported from Europe to the United States for the specific purpose of breeding.

Don "Whipper" O'Hearn, the goaltender whom the Halifax Saints are attempting to procure in order to replace Jimmy Strachan still did not have the clearance of the C.A.H.A. yesterday to take part in the M.M.H.L. playoffs which open here Monday night. M.A.H.A. President Walter Lawlor was in telephone conversation yesterday afternoon with George Dudley, Secretary-Manager of the C.A.H.A. and the latter stated that O'Hearn had not been cleared. O'Hearn, being a pro player must first receive the green light from Clarence Campbell, President of the N. H. L. Before O'Hearn can play here the President of the M.A.H.A. must be notified of the player's eligibility.

One thing that fans can be assured of is that Clarence Campbell will not put up with any monkey business. O'Hearn can only be allowed to come into the league as a replacement for a player who has been called up. Strachan obviously could not be called up to Syracuse since the Chiefs wound up their hockey season last week-end. About the only way the Saints could work Strachan into the American League would be to contrive some arrangement with Buffalo. Syracuse and Buffalo being closely connected they might conceivably try some arrangement whereby O'Hearn could become eligible.

The day after Moncton folded it was reported that goalie Don Lockhart had left for Syracuse, presumably to join the Chiefs. At the time it looked to us like a move to place Lockhart in the Halifax nets and if O'Hearn is declared ineligible there might yet be an attempt to bring the former Moncton goaltender into the Halifax camp by way of Buffalo. Strachan, by the way, is reported to be highly indignant over the move to bring in O'Hearn and so would any other player if they were jolted out of the play-off dough. Several days ago Strachan was pictured in a Halifax paper as the player who would have to hold up a sagging St. Mary's defence in the play-offs. Now he doesn't even rate an exhibition game with the Saints.

The Islanders returned about 5:30 yesterday evening from their two day trip to Cape Breton. They will hold an hour's workout at the Forum this morning around ten to keep their shooting eyes sharp for the series opener Monday night against the Saints. Last night coach Leo Lamoureux turned to Glace Bay for games on Friday and Saturday.

The Sydney Millionaires bowed out of the M.M.H.L. picture last night with a seven game unbeaten streak. But it won't be the great bid they made to catch a play-off berth that fans will remember, but this year's Sydney team. Rather it will be the disappointing showing which last year's Maritime champs made during the season.

At the last of it Sydney went out like champions. On and off the ice they made every attempt to land in fourth place. Their feats on the ice have been recorded in the sports pages more vividly than their efforts in the front office. Five attempts to pick up two points at the Islanders expense on the Paul Sandon case but their protest was turned down. As a last resort they attempted to secure two points from the Saint John Beavers through protesting the use of Doug Hewey and Al Perkins in a game which the Beavers defeated the Mills 6-2.

Here again their protest was turned down by the M. A. H. A. To begin with their protest was not filed until 12 days after the game was played instead of the required 24 hours and besides neither M. A. H. A. President Walter Lawlor nor his officers with whom he was in touch on Thursday felt that the Millionaires had a case. After winning as many championships as Sydney has, the Millionaires should know that the way to gain a play-off spot is to play hockey during the season.

Big Dunc MacIntyre closed out the season on an auspicious note. They may say a lot of things about the "Big Train" but they can't take away his prowess as a hockey player. Monday night when MacIntyre scored three goals here his left arm was taped from the shoulder to the wrist. Two weeks ago he had infection in his arm and the limb was still swollen when he played here. Why he won't take off his gloves and fight when provoked is something we can't figure because we believe he

Millionaires Bow Out Of Competition With 4-3 Win Over Glace Bay Miners

SYDNEY, N.S., March 21—(CP) For the first time in the history of bitter Sydney-Glace Bay hockey rivalry, the Forum gallery gave undivided and justified credit to the actions of both teams as Sydney Millionaires bowed out of Maritime Major League competition here tonight with a 4-3 triumph over the fourth-place Glace Bay Miners.

For the 1,601 spectators, chief focus was the come-uppance of 21-year-old Len (Comet) Haley, loudly applauded for the two goals and one assist he garnered. The tally moved the Miner rightwinger two points ahead of teammate Pete Wywrot in the race for league scoring honors.

Wywrot, who shot one goal and set-up both Haley's counters, took a firm grip on second place, two points ahead of Miner playing coach Norman (Bud) Polie, and Saint John Beaver Johnny Urbico who are now tied for third place.

But despite the establishment of Glace Bay's scoring stars on the top pegs, Millionaires left winger Dunc MacIntyre overshadowed the cumulative show by firing all of Sydney's goals in an unbroken second period string. He got three of them in a 42-second interval.

Miners had a 2-0 first period bulge, built up on goals by Haley and a blistering right wing shot by Wywrot when MacIntyre started his parade. He barged into the goal mouth to tip George Robertson's pass in at the nine minute mark of the second.

At 15:04 he roared around the right side and dragged Miner goalkeeper Bob Arnel down before slipping in the second. Fifteen seconds later he ripped a point-blank, standing shot through and at 15:46 he charged through to cage another in a scramble.

Miners had their last reply with the final period only 36 seconds old. Len Haley had two point-blank efforts blocked by Millionaires' Puck Hicks before shovelling the puck between the post and Hicks' state.

Millionaires continued to the end with a big territorial edge but despite their many thrusts couldn't break another by Arnel, playing one of his most brilliant games here this year.
