MONDAY

At week-end a meeting of the Dominion Provincial Farm Labor Committee was held in the offices of the Provincial Department of Agriculture.

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, presided. Mr. Dave Hay of the Regional Employment Office at Moncton came to the Island especially for the meeting.

Mr. J. B. MacLeod of W. S. MacLeod of the National Employment Office, Charlottetown, and Mr. Charles Hogan of the National Employment Office, Summerside.

First topic on the agenda was the question of supplying farmers with hay-making help. The Charlottetown Employment Office reported that orders for men were coming in briskly.

Mr. Hogan of the Summerside office said that few orders were being placed at his office.

Robert Bryenton, 19 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Bryenton, 59 Victory Ave., Charlottetown, and a student at St. Francis Xavier University, was fatally injured Saturday night when the car in which he was driving with a companion left the highway and overturned at Fairview, near Rocky Point.

The victim is said to have been travelling in a 1941 Plymouth car driven by his companion Jackie Notting, returning from a visit to a camping area near Fairview. For some reason, not yet determined, the car left the highway, passed over a deep ditch and after turning over, came to a stop with all four wheels in the air.

Mrs. Allison MacMillan, a trained nurse, who has charge of the Red Cross First Aid Post at Fairview, was on the scene almost at once, and with her husband rushed both the injured men to the P. E. Island Hospital, but Mr. Bryenton had expired before arriving.

Officers and ratings of L'Adventure, the French frigate now in port here, were widely entertained both officially and privately over the weekend. On Saturday the officers were guests at a reception held for them on board H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte and yesterday a group of officers went to Summerside where they called on Group Capt. A. G. Kenyon, commanding officer of the R.C.F. station there.

M. Robert Picard, French Consul at Halifax, came to the city to be present when the ship arrived. He travelled by car and was accompanied by Mrs. Picard.

Major Claude Ives left yesterday on return to India where he has been one of the Canadian Army officers acting as United Nations observers in Kashmir. Major Ives came home on leave in May after three years' absence on duty.

The task of the observers is to supervise the line drawn at the time of the cease-fire order in the dispute between India and Pakistan until such time as settlement is reached regarding the fate of Kashmir. The officers' work has taken them to many parts of the state and through some rugged mountain territory.

Major Ives is a son of Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Ives, Longworth Avenue, is a veteran of the Second World War during which he saw service in several theatres of action. He will sail for India from New York following a stay in Ottawa for official talks.

A large number of people were temporarily stranded at Rocky Point Saturday afternoon when "erry Fairview" developed a burst bearing and had to cease operations for several hours while repairs were made. Crowds of picnickers heading for home on the six o'clock sailing were left waiting on the wharf with a long string of cars. Other motorists on learning of the tie-up took to the road and drove the 22 miles around via the West River Bridge.

Yesterday at Zion Church the 92nd anniversary of the founding of the church was celebrated with special services of re-dedication and thanksgiving.

Both services were well attended and for the morning service, Rev. Donald A. Campbell of New London, P. E. I. was guest preacher and selected as his theme for the sermon, "Why I Believe in the Church".

At the evening service Rev. T.H.B. Somers M.A., S.T.M., pastor of St. James Church, Charlottetown, delivered the message, taking as his text, "Wilt Thou indeed be unto me as a deceitful brook, as waters that fail?"

Two Cardigan men, Rodrick Jeremiah Steele and Wendell Ellisworth Nicholson, charged with manslaughter, appeared before Joseph W. MacDonald, Q.C., at Georgetown Saturday. They were granted bail in amount of \$5,000 each. The case was adjourned until Thursday, July 10.

The men are charged in connection with the death on the Cardigan Road in Georgetown, Royalty on July 1 of Harry Rouse.

Mr. Buntain did not nominate in the general election four years later, but did in 1923 when he was again successful in carrying the seat along with Mr. L. L. Jenkins.

Mr. Buntain was known for his executive ability and was recognized as one of the more able debaters of his time.

Work on the construction of a new building for the Benevolent Irish Society is expected to start immediately on the site at 175 Grafton street where the former Whelan Hall was destroyed by fire last August.

Space for two stores will be provided on the first floor and office space will be arranged on the second floor. The basement will be fitted up for modern club rooms.

In addition there will be, as formerly, a large recreation hall for dances and other activities of the Society.

Mr. J. F. Connolly, chairman of the Land Valuation Board, which is operated under the Department of Education, states that in the three years in which the Board has been in operation, 120 School Districts out of a total of 486, have requested that surveys be made by the valuers.

Approximately 4,000 farms have been dealt with, and not a single appeal has been made against the decisions of the Board.

It is the usual custom of the school trustees, at their annual meeting in June, to decide if a survey is required. If this is agreed to, the survey is made and submitted to the Executive Council for approval.

The appointment of Mr. Donald B. MacBeth, B.A., and Mr. Wendell Horton to the staff of Prince Street School was confirmed during the regular monthly meeting of the City School Board yesterday afternoon. Dr. R. G. Lea, chairman of the Board, presided.

A decision was also reached to re-open the City Schools, following the summer vacation, on the day after Labor Day. School children will thus start the new term on Tuesday, September 2.

A true bill was found against Joseph Gabriel MacDonald, Chepstow, by a Kings County grand jury yesterday afternoon as the Supreme Court opened its July sittings in Georgetown. MacDonald is charged with murder in the shooting last November 8 of Mrs. Mary Ann MacKinnon in the kitchen of her home at Little Harbour.

He was committed to the Superior Magistrate's hearing before Magistrate Joseph MacDonald last January and has been confined in Georgetown Jail since then.

Messrs. J. O. C. Campbell, Q.C. and S.S. Hessian, Q.C., are appearing for the Crown. The defendant is represented by Messrs H. Frank McPhee, Q.C., and James B. Johnston.

After the Grand Jury brought in the true bill, the accused was arraigned and pleaded "not guilty."

This morning selection of a petit jury to try the case will be begun on a long panel of 68 prospective jurors. There will be approximately 20 witnesses called by the prosecution, many of them presenting testimony of a highly technical nature. The number to be called by the defense is not known.

The 39th annual convention of the P.E.I. Women's Institutes opened at Prince of Wales College yesterday morning with a good attendance.

Mr. Harold Laird, Kelvin Grove, provincial president, presided over the morning session and the convention was officially opened by the Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture. Mr. Baker, in a brief address, commended the members of the Institutes on their public spiritedness, and the many excellent works they perform. He advised them to make the improvement of rural life their future aim, by promoting better education, junior clubs, better entertainment and better reading material.

Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, Q.C., for the Crown, stated that he was attempting to outline the possible state of mind of the accused to show that a motive for

He is charged with the shooting to death of Mrs. John (Mary Ann) MacKinnon, Little Harbour, last November 8, through a kitchen window of her home.

One of the time-consuming arguments by counsel centred around efforts of defence counsel H. Frank McPhee, Q.C., to get into the record the evidence of R. C. M. P. Constable Thomas Hogarth, the service dog master, regarding the tracking efforts of the police dog which the constable had brought here at the time of the shooting.

That Mary Anne Thomas and Marlene Thomas came to their deaths by suffocating and burning by fire, which fire had been caused by an overheated stove or spark from the same, which destroyed the entire home at Fairview on June 24th, was the verdict handed down by the coroner's jury at a meeting held in the City Hall at 4 p.m. yesterday.

The case had been postponed from June 27th, in order that the evidence of Irene Marie Sapier, who was ill in hospital, might be taken.

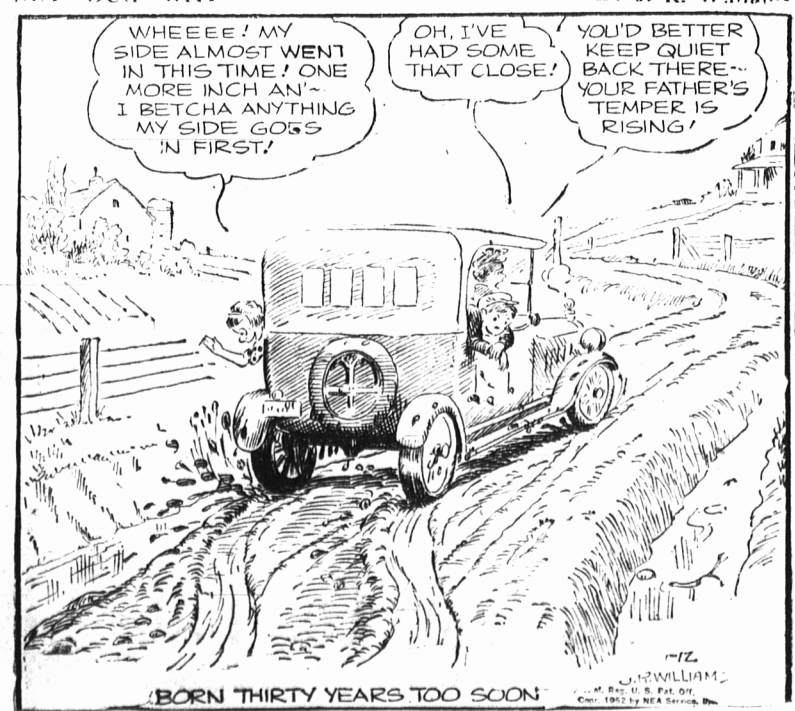

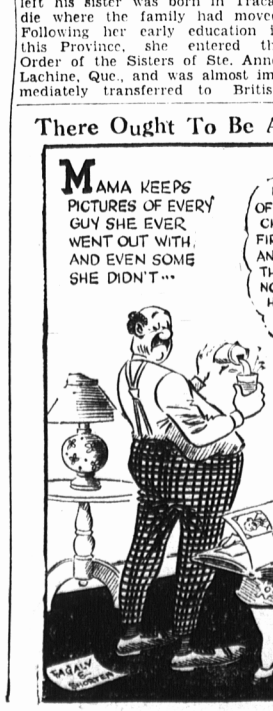
