Rev. John Dystant Honored At Illinois University

The many friends of Rev. John Dystant, will be pleased to know that at the 100th anniversary of the founding of Illinois Western University, at Bloomington, Illinois, the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him.

Mr. Dystant is a native of Ellerslie in Prince County. In his youth there were few opportunities, with no financial resources, of securing an education. Therefore, whatever success one achieved in his educational pursuits could only be obtained by perseverance and courage against almost insurmountable obstacles.

To earn money for an education, Mr. Dystant engaged in many types of work, such as working in a lobster factory; in the saw mill; in the lumberwoods; on a farm; with a construction crew with pick and shovel, and during one winter he did the chores at the home of a well to do farmer in Biddeford for his room and board.

He first attended school in the Biddeford school. This school, a one room building, was located in an open field between Ellerslie and Biddeford; there were no modern conveniences outside not even a wood shed, and few inside. There were a few home made desks along the two sides of the building, while the center of the building was filled with backless benches. The drinking water was brought from a spring by the pupils, which involved a distance of one mile for the round trip.

The new community of "Hard-scrabble" was the bounds of the Biddeford school district and the children of that community were permitted to go to school only when there were sufficient seats for them. Belonging to no school district, and with nearly two miles to walk, the chance of securing an education was very small.

The course of study in the old Biddeford school was very comprehensive, it embraced every subject from the Alphabet to the Sixty Reader. All the teachers were exceptionally well equipped for their work and no work was too exacting in their efforts in instructing their pupils. In this one room building, during the winter months, upwards of sixty boys and girls were in attendance.

The two outstanding teachers in this era were John A. Ives, who became Rev. John A. Ives and Lucy Maude Montgomery of Island fame.

After "graduating" from this open country school Mr. Dystant entered Mount Allison University where he spent two years. He was ordained to the Methodist Ministry in Charlottetown in June 1898. He held two pastorates in New Brunswick, and two on the "Island" viz The Pleasant Valley circuit, with Hunter River, Valley River, Stanley Bridge and Granville, and on the Margate Circuit with Margate, Kensington and Freetown.

In 1908 Dr. Dystant moved to Michigan, and during his Ministry there in the Methodist church, was appointed to some of the most important positions in the church. In Michigan he took up his education with Illinois Wesleyan University and earned the degrees of P.H.B. M.A. and PH.D. and recently the honorary degree of D.D.

A few years ago Mr. Dystant earned the degree of LL. B. and became a member of the Michigan State Bar. Mr. Dystant lives in Highland Park Michigan. His brother, Louis Dystant lives in Summerside, and another brother, Mr. W. C. Dystant lives in Highland Park, Mich.
