

Drabowsky Leads Orioles To First Series Victory

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Moe Drabowsky, an obscure, 31-year-old hand-me-down, set a World Series record for a relief pitcher with 11 strikeouts and hurled Baltimore Orioles to a 5-2 first-game victory over Los Angeles Dodgers Wednesday.

Taking over from starter Dave McNally in the third, after the Robinson boys bombed Don Drysdale with first-inning homers, Drabowsky allowed only one hit in 6 2/3 innings.

He struck out six in a row at one stretch, tying a series record.

When he struck out the side in the fourth and fifth, the Polish-born part time stock broker tied a 47-year-old mark put in the books by Cincinnati's Hod Eller against the Chicago White Sox in 1919, the scandalous Black Sox series.

Drabowsky, drafted out of the St. Louis Cardinals organization at Jacksonville in November after doing time with four big league and four minor league teams, was more famous for

negative statistics before this super effort on a warm, sunny California afternoon.

In 1957, with the Chicago Cubs, he tied a record by hitting four batsmen in one afternoon and led the National League in hit batsmen that same year.

It was Drabowsky who gave up Stan Musial's 3,000th hit and the hit that gave Early Wynn his 300th major league victory. He also was the victim of Dave Nicholson's famous homer over the stands in Comiskey Park a few years back.

Frank Robinson's two-run homer, following a walk to Russ Snyder, got McNally off to a good start in the first. Then Brooks Robinson, the other half of the Orioles' one-two punch, followed with another homer into the same lower left field stands.

Despite Jim Lefebvre's homer in the Dodger second McNally held a 4-1 edge going to the last of the third because Andy Etchebarren walked in the second, took second on a

sacrifice and scored on Snyder's single to left.

McNally suddenly lost all control in the third. After getting Willie Davis to fly out, he walked Lou Johnson, Tommy Davis and Lefebvre, loading the bases.

Hank Bauer strode to the mound and waved to the bullpen for Drabowsky. Moe relieved some of the pressure by striking out Wes Parker but then got too careful with Jim Gilliam and lost him on a 3-2 count, walking in a run.

Drabowsky went to 3-2 on John Roseboro before he made him foul out to Etchebarren, leaving three frustrated Dodgers on the bases.

Moe mixed a fine-breaking ball with an assortment of soft stuff and some quickies to strike out pinch hitter Jim Barbieri, Maury Wills and Willie Davis in the fourth.

He followed this by whiffing Lou Johnson, Tommy Davis and Lefebvre in the fifth. Parker finally broke the strikeout string by lofting a fly to Curt Blefary opening the sixth.

fact, the American League teams tallied only three runs in those five games. Baltimore tied that in one inning.

Trailing by one game, just as they were a year ago in Minnesota, the Dodgers will call on Sandy Koufax, the ace winner, to even the series in today's second game. He will be opposed by 20-year-old Jim Palmer, whose 15-10 record led the Orioles in victories.

Koufax clinched the pennant for the Dodgers in the final game of the season Sunday in Philadelphia. Palmer pitched the clincher for the Orioles Sept. 22, and they eased home a nine-game winner in the American League.

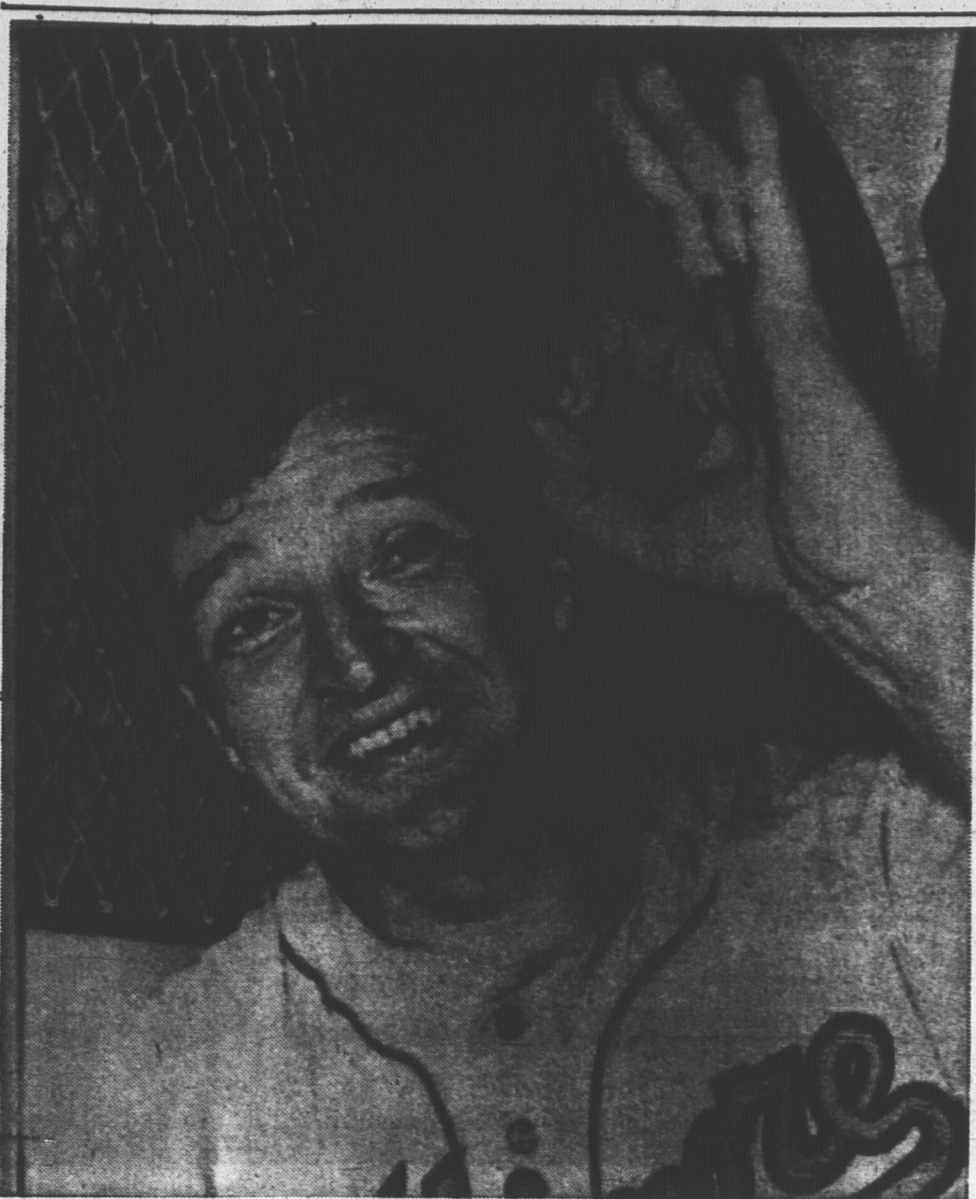

Batting And Great Pitcher Told Story

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Baltimore Orioles played the first game of the World Series Wednesday the way they won the American League pennant: Power from the Robinson boys and great relief pitching.

Frank Robinson, a triple-crown winner during 1966, slugged a two-run homer in the first inning off Don Drysdale. Brooks Robinson followed with a solo homer, and the Orioles went on to win 5-2.

After Dave McNally, the struggling Baltimore reliever, was relieved in the third inning, Moe Drabowsky came out of the bullpen and hurled one-hit ball over the final 6 2/3 innings.

Rookie catcher Andy Etchebarren said Drabowsky threw "about 85 per cent fast balls, with a few sliders and a couple of curves."

His fast ball was excellent. Etchebarren said Drabowsky confirmed a scouting report which said: "A good fast ball

can be thrown past the Dodgers."

The 31-year-old right-hander started only three games this season but posted a 6-0 record while appearing mostly in long relief roles.

WAS LOGICAL CHOICE
"He was my logical choice," manager Hank Bauer said, "because he had the most experience."

Bauer said he would have brought in reliever Stu Miller in the ninth had Drabowsky walked leadoff hitter John Roseboro, who struck out after the count reached 3-1.

Brooks Robinson claimed the two-run homer by Frank Robinson "did more for me than my homer. Frank took the pressure off everybody, especially me."

Frank claimed his clutch, which landed about three rows deep into the left field stands, "wasn't hit well, but I got enough of it and hit it in the right direction."

Slovak Will Assault Record

ZEPHYR COVE, Nev. (AP)—Tahoe Miss, the newly crowned national champion unlimited hydroplane racer, will try to break the world speed record for propeller-driven craft Oct. 21-23 at Lake Tahoe.

The boat is being equipped by owner-gambler William Harrah with a turbine-driven supercharger and other alterations. Mra Slovak, a former Czechoslovakian pilot who drove Tahoe Miss to the top of the 1966 American Powerboat Association point standings, will be at the helm.

The world speed mark is 200.419 miles an hour, established by Miss U.S. I at Gunterville Lake, Ala.

The Lake Tahoe course will be five miles long, with a two-mile straightaway for acceleration.

"You've got to give credit to Drabowsky," said manager Walter Alton in his post-game review. "I remember he was a strong thrower as a youngster back when he was with the Chicago Cubs. Then he had a sore arm, I understand."

"But it looked like today he threw as good as he ever did and had better control."

The Dodger dressing room was quiet for a few minutes after they trooped in from the field. But, eventually, a bit of horseplay broke out.

Don Drysdale, who went out after two innings and successive home runs by the Robinson boys, Frank and Brooks, said: "You got to give them credit. They're good hitters. I just didn't put the ball where I wanted to. And any good hitter is tough."

Coach Says Canada Will Not Win 1 Medal In 1968

VANCOUVER (CP) — Canada's top swimming coach says this country will be fortunate to win a swimming medal at the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico City.

Howard Firby of Vancouver said in an interview Wednesday the picture of Canada emerging as a world swimming power because of 22 medals—including seven golds—at the British Empire Games this year in Jamaica is nothing more than a myth and the public is in for a real shock at the Olympics.

"The best finish for a Canadian at the Tokyo Olympics in 1964 was fifth," he warned. "We'll have to be very fortunate to do better in '68."

Firby, coach of the Canadian Dolphins Swimming Club, headed the 1959 B.E.G. team and the 1964 Olympics squad and helped Mary Stewart and Elaine Tanner become world champions. Miss Tanner won four gold medals in Jamaica.

Firby says Canadians should rejoice about the Jamaica showing but not be deceived by it. "It's going to make it hard to explain later, after the Olympics. The swimmers and the coaches know the score but the man on the street thinks we're world beaters."

Firby, 41, said the problem is two-fold: Lack of depth and lack of incentive. He says more trips to other countries could give the seniors the incentive they need to stick with the sport and more pool time could help develop younger swimmers.

Firby said money is needed for high pool rentals and to finance trips which would take swimmers to top competition. "If Elaine Tanner lived in Russia," Firby said, "you can bet she would have eight years of swimming left in her. She wouldn't want for anything. I'm not suggesting we go that far, but we've got to do something."

Firby said Elaine has almost unlimited potential and has her mind set on an Olympic gold medal, "but standards are improving so incredibly quickly."

Other countries were forging ahead with changes in technique and attitudes, making a shambles of world records.

Firby said that almost all European best times are faster than those at Jamaica. Last year the July Americans went to Moscow for a dual meet and the Russians, comparative newcomers to the sport, took six of the 18 events.

Firby says these are some of the reasons Canadians must come down out of the clouds with their swimming hopes. "Making an Olympic final is equal to winning the Commonwealth Games."

Mahovich Hurt In Detroit Game

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP) — Frank Mahovich, star right winger with Toronto Maple Leafs, suffered a cracked rib Tuesday night and will be lost to the team for several days.

The injury occurred in the second period of a National Hockey League exhibition game here between Detroit Red Wings and the Leafs. The Red Wings won 5-1.

Mahovich was trying to intercept Bruce MacGregor, a Detroit right winger, when the Leafs Bob Baun hit MacGregor. The 175-pound Red Wing centre fell to the ice with his skate jammed into Mahovich's right side.

"It's in an awkward spot and they couldn't tape it," said the Leaf winger. "There's quite a bit of pain when I breathe, but I can thank that ball on the heel of MacGregor's skate for saving me from a very nasty cut and possible serious injury."

MacGregor had protective devices in the form of plastic caps at the heels of his skates. MacGregor suffered a charley horse in the collision and also will be sidelined for a few days.

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
