### Island Native Receives Degree

Mark Keith Inman, a native of P.E.I., has been awarded the degree of Doctor of Letters by Acadia University.

Mr. Inman was born in 1899 at Argyle Shore, the son of Peter and Emily (Matheson) Inman. He graduated from Acadia with the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1925. Subsequently he engaged in graduate study at Oxford and Harvard, receiving from Harvard the Degrees of Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy. In 1928 Dr. Inman began a career in university teaching at Queen's University.

After one year at Queen's, he accepted a position as assistant professor of economics and political science at the University of Western Ontario. He has served at Western since that time, becoming head of his department in 1939, associate dean of arts and science in 1962, dean in 1963 and vice-president, arts and science in 1965.

Dr. Inman's publications include "A Social Approach to Economics", "Economics in a Canadian Setting" and "The Role of Trust and Loan Companies in the Canadian Economy."

**SUMMERSIDE** — Funeral services for Harold Lyle, a well known resident of Summerside, will be held this afternoon at one o'clock at Trinity United Church in Summerside. Mr. Lyle died Thursday after a brief illness.

## Island Cattlemen Have Successes

Prince Edward Island cattlemen have scored some notable successes in the show rings at the Nova Scotia provincial exhibition at Truro this week.

Daniel Jewell, East Wiltshire, took five first placings, two seconds, one third and two fourths in the dual purpose Shorthorn class.

Mr. Jewell had the junior champion male, the grand champion male and the reserve grand champion female.

The Fulton Sanderson and Sons Hereford herd from York Point made an outstanding showing. They only took six animals to the Truro fair because of transportation difficulties, caused by the strike, but they got five firsts, two seconds and one third. They had the grand champion female and the reserve grand female, along with the reserve grand male.

An unusual part of this Sanderson story is their success at Crapaud this week with what was left home, after the show string went to Truro. They had the champion male, the senior champion female and the reserve grand female.

Boyd Dixon, Clyde River did not get into the first placings with his Angus herd, but he had a number of seconds and thirds as he made the winners fight for top position in practically every section.

Barry Rankin, Bunbury, and Irving MacDonald, York, also showed Angus cattle at Truro and Allison Stewart, Dunstaffnage, showed sheep. The details were not available last night though one report said Mr. MacDonald got at least one championship ribbon, and Mr. Stewart was very strong in the championships and top placings in the sheep classes he contested.

The Roy Younker and Harrison Green and Sons Guernsey herds from Kingston made strong showings as detailed in this paper Friday.

### Corporation Reviews Needs-Projects

The board of directors of Senior Citizens Housing Corporation and the housing authority of this province met recently to discuss matters under its jurisdiction. It was learned that the units of senior citizens housing constructed in various parts of the province this summer are, for the most part, ready for occupancy. Many of the persons who have been assigned space in the new 45-unit project on North River Road have moved in and full occupancy is expected shortly.

The Board is anxious to assess accurately the needs of the citizens of the province who might qualify for any of the categories of housing accommodation being provided. Under the Housing Authority Act are included: senior citizens housing, homes for the aged, Co-Op Housing and low-rental housing. In assessing the present situation it was noted that in many of the areas of the province the demand for senior citizens' accommodation far exceeds the supply available. On the other hand, it is disturbing to note that a six unit establishment at Rustico as yet, has no occupancy. A careful study will be made by the new board to ensure that an adequate and well-planned program of public housing will be provided for the citizens of this province.

The board, under the chairmanship of Hon. Gordon Bennett, consists of: Hon. Kelly Clark, Montague, minister of Municipal Affairs, vice-chairman; Bert G. Campbell, Charlottetown, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. Eugene Perry, Tignish; Hon. Lorne Bonnell, Murray River, Minister of Welfare; F. Earle MacDonald, Summerside and Sterling Beaton, Charlottetown.

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## Court Fines Speeders

## Plant Manager Denies Rumors

L. W. MacLeod, general manager of Canada Packers Ltd. Charlottetown plant denied current rumors that the company's plant on Grafton Street would not reopen and that the plant had been sold.

Mr. MacLeod said, "the plant has not been sold, it is not for sale and it will reopen for business as soon as our current labor problems are resolved."
