"The animals on Prince Edward Island are very badly mistreated and there is a great need for some type of supervision to make sure that this sort of thing doesn't continue," Edward Price, secretary-treasurer of the Charlottetown branch of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals said Tuesday following the monthly meeting of the society.

"Farmers in particular are to blame," she said, "and of all people our own islanders should be the least responsible. It has been brought to our attention on several occasions, and many of our members have actually seen farm animals in some of the most unbelievable states of neglect that can be imagined."

"We have found filthy, dirty stalls where animals are cramped they can hardly breathe. Many, many animals are only half fed, but yet their owners expect full milk production from them. We have also found that in loading cattle for shipment to other parts of the country, in many cases no regard whatsoever is given to the health of the animals in the cars, and many more animals than a necessary are forced together," she explained.

Mrs. Price also said the society's findings that animals are treated in winter months was even worse. "The conditions in many barns and stalls are very bad. The buildings are very cold and again the point of feed is not being given."

INSPECTOR APPOINTED - The SPCA felt that the only way to fight these conditions was to have an authorized person who could, after discovering it was to blame, have the power to bring the offender up before a court of law.

At a special meeting on May 14 Vernon Dennis, Charlottetown, was appointed to the position of inspector whose job would be just that—to bring before the court any person who is guilty of mistreating animals in a cruel manner.

For the time being, Mr. Dennis, who was sworn into his post by Magistrate J.B. Johnston, will be the only person with the authority. However, the society hopes that within the next few months other areas of the province will also be sworn in.

Accused Said 'Normal'

Appearing in Queens County magistrate's court before Magistrate J.B. Johnston, QC, yesterday was Frederick Harold White, 46, of the Whitehouse, as testimony was heard from Dr. C.A. Coody, Charlottetown, regarding the mental state of the accused.

Dr. Coody explained that he had examined young White the previous evening in order to assess his mental capabilities. "I would say that this boy is within the limits of normalcy and is my opinion that he is not mentally ill. The only abnormal thing I found about him was his criminal history."

On cross examination Dr. Coody said "I do think the accused would benefit from psychiatric treatment, but so would many other people in every day life. I found no evidence of emotional disturbance in the accused."

White, being held on a charge of uttering a forged document, then gave his consent to be examined by a recognized psychiatrist and was remanded until May 29 when the results of that examination will be heard.

Also on the docket a 17 year old young pleaded guilty to a charge of being unlawfully intoxicated in a public place and was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days. He was given a suspended sentence by Magistrate Johnston to the effect that he was under age and not only he, but also the person who sold him the liquor could face serious charges if it ever happened again.
