RENSELAER, N.Y. (AP) — A nursing home described by a state investigator as an "abominable example" of closed Thursday because the proprietor said he was not ready to open.

"It was just impossible. There were 18 state and federal agencies pulling all kinds of questions and statistical requests across my desk. Medical reports, certificates, insurance, social security, workers' compensation, withholding taxes, daily reports, and so on," said the proprietor.

Mrs. Earl Gundrum, who has operated the 24-room Renselaer nursing home for 10 years, added:

"In one form they asked me to have any dealer with a labor union. I checked 'no.' They asked me if I received any gifts from out of state. I told them no. I left that blank, figuring if I didn't deal with a union I naturally didn't receive any gifts.

"So they sent the questionnaire blank, telling me to fill in the blanks.

"I've had one darn thing after another."

Mrs. Gundrum had 21 patients and 10 employees.

A letter from the state social welfare department last week said that the "Your staff and yourself are doing a very good job. Excellent services offered the patients entrusted in your care."

Medina from Caracas, is the only international master in Venezuela and came to the tournament—largest chess meet in the western hemisphere—as an official representative of that country's chess federation.

3 To Stand Trial On Rape Charge

SUMMERSIDE — The three men charged with rape, Leonard Joseph Noonan, Donald Joseph Noonan of Borden, and Edison McKenna of Albany were committed to stand trial at the next sitting of Supreme Court at the conclusion of the preliminary hearings yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester S. Macdonald.

The trio is charged with the rape of a 63-year-old Borden woman, Mrs. Norman Allen on July 22.

The final three witnesses in the preliminary hearing were members of the RCMP. Capt. William Rowan, Summerside testified that about 9:15 on July 22 he and Const. Fred Connolly responded to a police radio call to Rose Valley. When the two police officers arrived they saw a 1961 blue and white Lincoln coupe parked on the western road, Const. Oland of the Borden detachment was already there, he stated, along with MacKenzie, Const. Hovan and Const. Connolly left, he said.

Cpl. Donald MacKenzie, in charge of the identification branch at the Charlottetown RCMP detachment testified at Rose Valley he examined the interior of the Consul and then drove to the Borden detachment headquarters. Cpl. MacKenzie showed the court a sketch he had drawn of the Albany area, where the alleged offence was said to have been committed.

Cpl. Macdonald also took several pictures of the area, and the three men were taken from the road and found to sign their names on an empty pop and broken cigarette. He also took a photograph of a tire tread in the ground nearby. This tread pattern was the same as that of the Consul Capri and the two were identical he stated.

ASKS BAIL

Defence Counsel J. Watson Macdonald asked the court to release the three men on bail. Charles R. McQuaid, representing the attorney general's department objected to bail because he said "out of ordinary" circumstances surrounded this case. He said the Court would insist on a high bail if it was granted.

Mr. Macdonald said he was shocked by the core of my belief at the attack on the Crown. He said that bail should be set so that it may be obtained by the accused, or else he said it would be almost the same as granting no bail if it was set at high enough.

Cpl. Elder phoned Mrs. Elder's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Everett Simmons, Summerside, East, Sunday night stating he and Layne would return by car to Summerside and would fly back to Montreal to bring his wife home next week. However she passed away as the result of a heart attack Tuesday.

Mrs. Elder was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Simmons, two young brothers having predeceased her a number of years ago.

The remains are resting at the Compton Funeral Home until Saturday then to St. Mary's Church for service at 2 p.m. Interment will be in St. John's cemetery, Capraud.

MONTREAL (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders, supposedly torn by dissension and minus coach Frank Clark upset Montreal Alouettes 29-18 Thursday night before 23,534 Eastern Football Conference fans.

The Roughies, looking anything but disgruntled, rode the payoff throwing quarterback Ron Lancaster and a tight defensing game to their initial victory this season.

They were tackling so hard that at one point early in the final quarter three Alouettes were racked up and sidelined on three successive plays.

Bill Smyth, Clark's assistant coach, went all the way with Lancaster at quarterback in something of a surprise, holding Ron Jackson on the bench. Clark, suffering an acutely strained back, watched the game on television from an Ottawa hospital. He was admitted Tuesday.

Handicraft Exhibition Set For Ch'town In Oct.

Tentative date for a handicraft exhibition, which will launch the province's venture into a tourist handicraft industry, has been set for Oct. 9 and 10 at Prince of Wales College auditorium in Charlottetown, Tourist Development Minister J. David Stewart said yesterday.

Mr. Stewart and provincial travel bureau director George V. Fraser visited the New Brunswick department of industry's handicraft training school at Fundy Park on Wednesday.

The New Brunswick school was exactly what we wanted to see," Mr. Stewart said. "It is extremely popular with tourists in arts and crafts training and all classes are booked several weeks ahead. The school consists of six buildings and can handle about 75 students at a time."

At the Charlottetown exhibition there will be an explanation of the training program proposed for this province. Dr. Ivan Crowell, director of the New Brunswick program, and several instructors from the school will bring materials and equipment to provide a handicraft making display.

Mr. Stewart said there will be plenty of opportunity for discussion periods for those interested in taking part in the handicraft industry.

Totem Pole Carver Dies

VICTORIA (CP)—Chief Mungo Martin, 63, world-famous totem pole carver, died in hospital here Thursday.

He was admitted some weeks ago with a heart ailment and had been in poor condition for more than a week.

"He was laughing and talking with us yesterday afternoon," said his granddaughter Mrs. Henry Hunt.

Chief Martin's body will lie in state in the Big House at Victoria's Thunderbird Park and will be buried at his Port Rupert birthplace at the northern tip of Vancouver Island.

Chief Martin was a pure-blood Indian and an artist who carried on much of the traditional culture of his people.

Six years ago he carved the world's tallest totem pole, rising 127 feet, six inches above the ground, in Beacon Hill Park.
