

# Maple Leafs, Boston Bruins Share First Place In NHL

The National Hockey League season is only one week old but the Toronto Maple Leafs have already offered impressive proof that their strong finish in 1958-59 was no fluke.

For nearly three seasons the Leafs lingered in the wilderness before coming with a rush last March that carried them to the Stanley Cup finals against Montreal.

Today the Leafs are undefeated and share first place with Boston Bruins after impressive 6-3 and 5-1 victories over highly-rated Chicago Black Hawks during the weekend.

But the resurgent Leafs must share the spotlight with Boston who unleashed tremendous scoring power in routing New York Rangers 6-4 Saturday and then stunned Montreal Canadiens Sunday night with an 8-4 drubbing at Boston.

The Uke line centred by Bronco Horvath for Johnny Bucyk and Vic Stasiuk did most of the damage against New York and Montreal. The line collected seven goals and 11 assists for 18 points in the two games.

**THIRD SETBACK**  
In other games, Montreal and Detroit battled to a 1-1 tie Saturday and then the Red Wings handed the Rangers their third straight setback with a 4-2 triumph at Detroit Sunday.

Veteran Bert Olmstead who scored only 10 goals all last season was the key man in Toronto's weekend sweep.

Olmstead, obtained from Montreal at the end of the 1957-58 season to add experience to the Leafs lineup, scored twice Saturday and insured Toronto's win Sunday night when he outgunned Hawks' netminder Glenn Hall for the third goal with 26 seconds remaining in the game.

George Armstrong, Frank Mahovich, Tim Horton and Bob Bauh scored other Toronto goals Saturday night while Tod Sloan, Bobby Hull and rookie Stan Mikita tallied for Chicago. Bauh's goal was only his third in 139 NHL games.

At Chicago Sunday, Bob Pulford and Ted Hampson were the other Leaf marksmen. Hampson's goal was his first in big time competition. Ron Murphy scored for Chicago.

**POWERHOUSE FOR BRUINS**  
Horvath, Bucyk and Stasiuk were the whole show for Boston. Horvath picked up two goals and one assist Saturday and followed up with one goal and three more assists in the big win over the

Habs. Bucyk tallied once and assisted once Saturday and then pumped home two more goals and added an assist Sunday. Stasiuk picked up a goal and three assists Sunday to go with two assists he had Saturday.

Jerry Topozzini, Doug Mohns and Larry Leach got other Bruin markers while Brian Cullen, John Hanna and Ken Schinkle, with two, tallied for Rangers Saturday.

Bruins broke Sunday's game wide open in the third period with four goals. Topozzini, Don McKenney and rookie Ant Erickson also scored for Bruins.

Marcel Bonin got two of Montreal's four goals with the others going to Claude Provost and defenceman Tom Johnson. Bernie Geoffrion had three assists. Goaltender Jacques Plante of Montreal and Terry Sawchuk of

## SPORT ECHOES

It's surprising how many sports writers consider what happens in a World Series as a positive index of the contending clubs' strengths and weaknesses. Actually the series is just a glorified and much publicized edition of any one series of games throughout the season. If it is true that one swallow doesn't make a summer, or a hangover, then surely it is equally true that a World Series doesn't prove too much in the department of who's better than who.

For example, take Early Wynn. He won 22 games. But he lost—was it a dozen? He was a conquering hero 22 times, and a frustrated finger going down to ignominious defeat a dozen times. If that is the correct number. What shall we call him, hero or goat? We have to call him goat because he lost two games in the world series.

How can anyone assess the ability of a team which took part in 154 games during the season, by what they do in six games after the season is finished. Both Los Angeles and Chicago had their good and bad series during the long haul. It happened that the Dodgers, riding the crest of a sensational finish in their own league, used that momentum to beat the Sox. If another World Series were started tomorrow, isn't it about half way between the realms of possibility and probability that Wynn would be a hero, and Sherry, yes, even Sherry, would be a goat.

We'll grant you there is more at stake in the World Series, and what writers call "money" players may play over their heads, and others disparage themselves in manner below par, but even this generalization is not fool-proof, because a hero in one World Series is often a goat in another—take Hodges for an example. The Dodgers showed marked superiority in their 9-3 victory, but the White Sox weren't exactly bad in that 11-0 affair. If Anaricio had got the ball that skipped over his glove, who knows how it all would have ended? As Al Lopez said, it was just one of those things, and he wasn't referring to the "thing" in left field at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

Teams have poor series and good series. If they're a good team, they have poor good series.

### Mounties Crush Axemen 107-3

SACKVILLE, N. B. (CP)—Mount Allison Mounties gained more than 1,000 yards running and passing Saturday in whipping Acadia Axemen 107-3 to set a Maritime Intercollegiate Football Union record.

Scoring nearly two points a minute the Mounties picked up an impressive 591 yards along the ground and another 431 in the air.

Available records indicate that Mount Allison is the first Maritime team to reach the century mark. They broke their own league record of 86 points in a game. They beat St. Thomas Tommies 86-0 in 1957.

Pete Smallman from Montreal led the onslaught with four touchdowns. Bruce Macfarlane and Bob Windsor picked up three TDs each and quarterback Milan Zipy counted a pair. Ricky Black and Bob McLaren added single touchdowns and Harry Haukkala scored one and booted 11 converts.

## Stamps Keep Alive; Upset Eskies 41-23

Calgary Stampede kept alive their playoff hopes Monday by upsetting Edmonton Eskies 41-23 and moving into a third-place tie with British Columbia Lions in the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

The victory at Edmonton followed a Stampeder massacre of Saskatchewan Roughriders 53-13 at Calgary Saturday.

In the other Monday game, the front-running Winnipeg Blue Bombers scored a 27-14 triumph over the Roughriders at Regina. At Vancouver Saturday, the second-place Eskies mauled the Lions 38-14.

**PASSES CLICK**  
At Edmonton, Stamp halfback Gene Filipki scored two touchdowns on passes from quarterback Joe Kapp and rolled 40 yards for a third.

Four of quarterback Jackie Parker's passes were intercepted by Calgary and three of the interceptions set up touchdown drives. Kapp and fullback Earl Lunsford also scored Calgary touchdowns. Guard Doug Brown kicked two field goals and five converts.

Parker scored a touchdown, a field goal and two converts and halfback Joe-Bob Smith and fullback Normie Kwong also counted touchdowns for Edmonton.

Meanwhile, at Regina the Bombers' win kept them four points ahead of Eskimos while Saskatchewan absorbed its 12th loss in 13 games.

**LEWIS SPARKLES**  
Halfback Leo Lewis scored two of Bombers touchdowns while new end Ferrell Funston, a standout in the game, and end Ernie Pitts accounted for the others. The touchdown by Pitts was his 14th on a pass this year to tie a league record set by Saskatchewan's Jack Hill last year.

Quarterback Jim Van Pelt threw four touchdown passes, kicked three converts but was wide on his fourth try.

Fullback Ken Carpenter and end Ron Dundas tallied the Rider touchdowns, both of them converted by Reg Whitehouse. Van Pelt completed 11 of 21 passes for 254 yards and Bombers rushed for 116. Roughriders led in first downs with 20 against 16 for Bombers.

John Choquette, the horse was timed in 4:50 3/4 for 1-1/16 miles over a heavy track. Tony Graff paid \$20.20 and \$7.20 while Netege returned \$2.60 to show.

In Lexington, Ky., Hal Price Headley's Rash Statement used a late rush to put down Patty's Son and win the \$35,525 Alcibiades stakes, opening day feature at Keeneland.

At Albany, Calif., Mr. Eiffel came from behind to score a two-length victory in Golden Gate field's \$28,200 derby.

Sailor's Guide scored an easy three three-length victory as he ran the 1 1/4 miles in 2:09 1-5 over a grass course which was heavy after a week of wet weather.

Ekaba, owned by Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Reuben of Toledo, Ohio, was second while Mahan, owned by B. R. Steen of Toronto, was third. The winner was backed confidently and paid \$3.30 straight.

## Round Table Cops Rich Manhattan

NEW YORK (AP)—The Kerr Stable's Round Table took command about an eighth of a mile from home to capture the \$38,200 Manhattan Handicap at Aqueduct Saturday. The racing world's biggest money winner was ridden by Willie Shoemaker.

The Manhattan was a rugged 1 1/2-mile route and Round Table's time of 2:42 3-5 was listed as a track record. Middle Brother set the mark of 2:44 2-5 in winning the Lawrence Realization under 120 pounds Sept. 30.

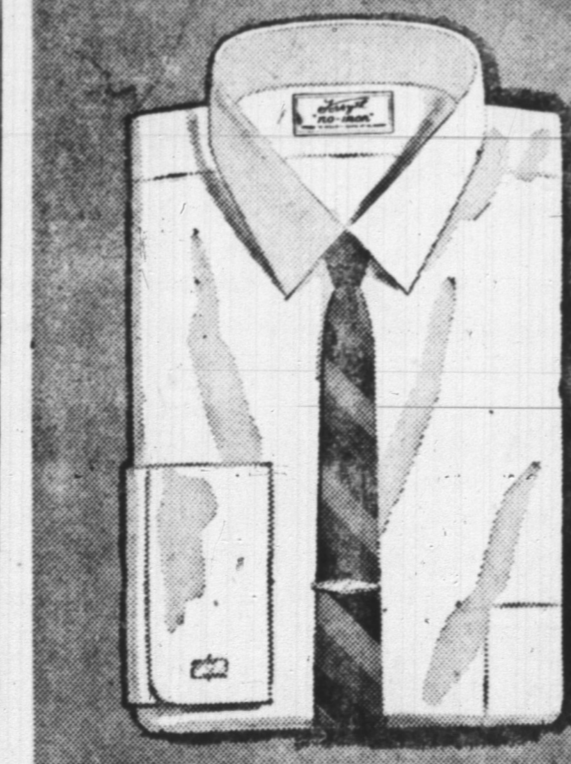
Round Table won by a length over Bald Eagle, who came up in the stretch to take second by 1 1/2 lengths over Colonel.

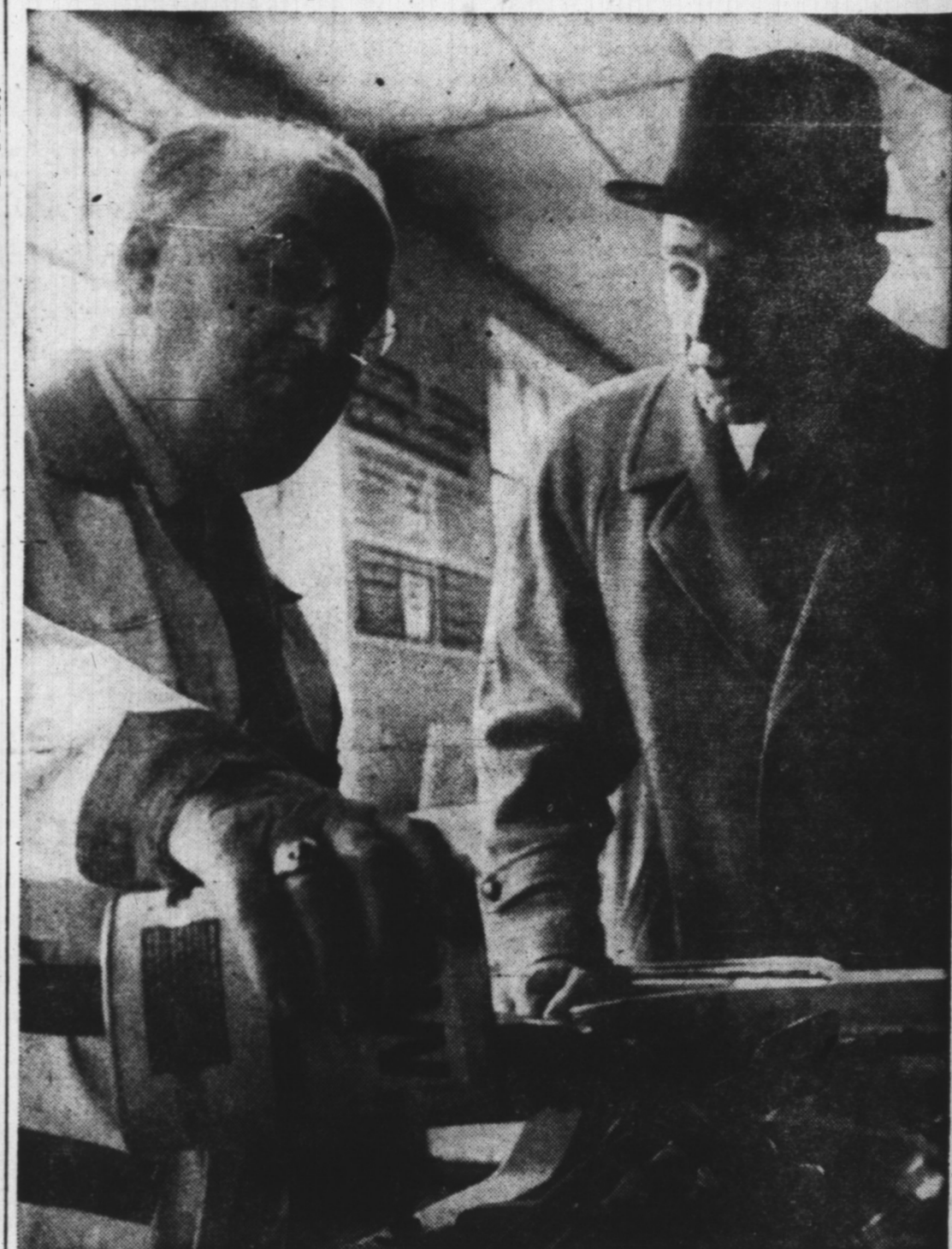
