The November-December News Letter issued by the Dominion Drama Festival announces the appointment of André Van Gysegem, British actor, producer and lecturer to adjudicate this year's Regional Festivals.

Among other notable activities in the production of plays, Mr. Van Gysegem, in joint management with his wife, Jean Forbes-Robertson, daughter of the great British actor, Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson, produced and played in "Bank-Ley Square," "Twelfth Night," "Distant Point," "48 Hours Leave" and "The Mirror."

Early in January Mr. Van Gysegem will meet the Regional Adjudicator at Corner Brook, Nfld. and start on his tour of duty which commences with the Newfoundland Regional Festival scheduled for the 11th-15th of January. He is expected to adjudicate in Charlottetown on Friday January 28. NICOSIA, Cyprus—(Reuters)—Cyprus police Sunday arrested 50 rioters in Nicosia as anti-British demonstrators battled police, despite a warning that troublemakers will be fired on.

This brings to 92 the total arrested in Cyprus in two days of riots, chiefly staged by students angry at Britain and the United States for voting at a United Nations meeting last week to defer the Cyprus case.

Jeering, whistling students set up catapults and stoned police outside the British Institute in Metaxas

square in the heart of this colonial capital.
