Redistribution of Seats.

ABOUT the time of the opening of Parliament, THE EXAMINER suggested that it might be well to redistribute the seats for this Province on the plan which has been adopted throughout Canada.

The suggestion was, we may say, offered without reference to the advantage of either party, and without the knowledge of any of the party politicians.

These quadrangular contests are expensive, they necessitate a very heavy labor, they prevent careful enquiry and thorough discussion, it is impossible to obtain by means of them a fair expression of the views of a majority of the people; they are anomalous in Canada, and they should, therefore, be supplanted in this Province by the cheaper, simpler, easier and more direct contests which prevail throughout the Dominion.

On these grounds—and apart altogether from parties and politicians—we again commend THE EXAMINER'S suggestion to Parliament and the country.

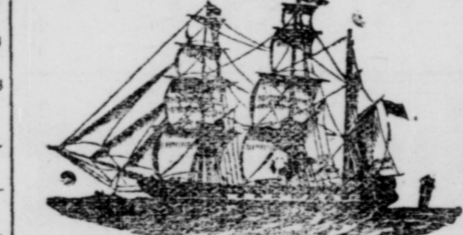
