Opening This Morning Of Annual Musical Festival

The gratifying results of months of intensive training under proficient instructors will begin to unfold before an expectant public this morning when the curtain rises on the first presentation at the Holy Redeemer Community Centre in a nine-day series of competitive Festival of Music in P. E. Island.

No more colourful or pleasing first-day program could have been conceived than the one planned which will bring together 25 tartan-clad dancers, nine years old and under, and 17 sword dancers in the same age range, to be adjudicated by Major C. MacLeod of Sydney, N.S.

At 2:00 p.m. a more advanced group consisting of nine entries in the age range 10 to 12 years inclusive will compete for honours in the double sword dance to be followed by no less than 29 contestants in the ever-popular Highland Fling.

P.W.C. AUDITORIUM For the evening activities the scene shifts to the Auditorium of the Prince of Wales College where at 7:30 p.m. the Adjudicators, Mrs. Balsler of Moncton, N.B., Major MacLeod of Sydney and Dr. Geo. C. Fisher will be called upon to decide on the relative efficiency of the contestants in the diversified program.

While this program continues to feature Scottish dances in which the be-medalled older girls, wearing the spoils of former victories predominate, many other entertaining numbers will add to the enjoyment of the evening.

New zesty features of the Festival will be viewed and heard for the first time with the appearance of Junior Farmer and 4H Club contestants in the square dance numbers. Later during the series of events, this broadening field of rural activities will be further represented by individual and collective participants and members of the Women's Institutes in many centres of the province.

Other equally interesting numbers will be submitted by the bagpipe band, double tap dancing units—13 years and under; double sword dance 13 to 16 years and the senior dancers. "Own selection" dances will also bring to the fore the skill of groups ranging from ten years old and under to the more experienced and developed artists. The first day of the Festival as described is but a foretaste of the amazing variety of entertaining features to be presented in the series covering a period of ten days, with 5,500 entries scheduled for Charlottetown and Summerside.

OFFICIAL OPENING The official opening of the Festival will take place in the Auditorium of Prince of Wales College at 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, when a diversified program of rare interest will bring to the fore many adult artists of distinction as well as various younger groups including two brass bands and several commendable group singing aggregations.

Monarch Sails To Complete New Cable Link SYDNEY (CP)—The Monarch, world's largest cable-laying ship, leaves here today to complete the western link of a two-strand trans-Atlantic telephone cable.

The ship will lay a 350-mile cable between Sydney Mines and Terenceville, Nfld. The main Atlantic link runs from Clarenville, Nfld. to Oban, Scotland. One strand has already been laid between Oban and Clarenville and the Monarch will begin laying the second strand when she completes the second cable of the Newfoundland-Nova Scotia link. The system, expected to be com-

pleted later this year, is being constructed by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, the British post office department and the Canadian Overseas Telecommunication Corporation. The estimated cost is more than \$40,000,000.
