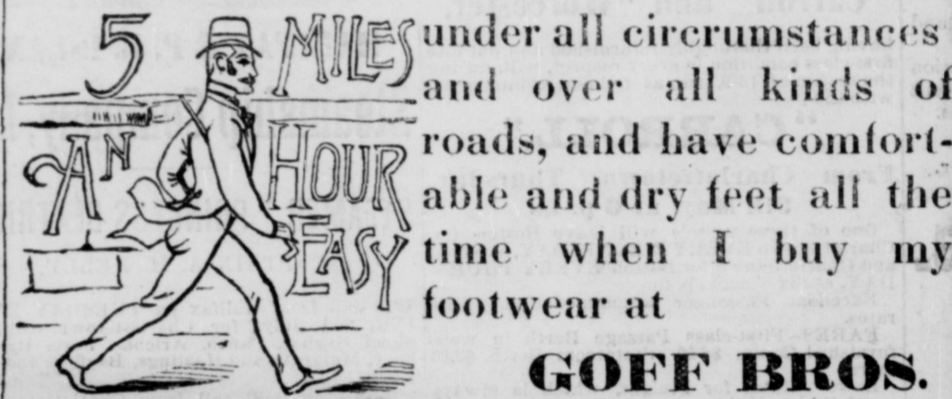

Midsummer Examinations.

ST. DUNSTAN'S COLLEGE.

We regret that THE EXAMINER'S space, to-day, will not admit of a full report of the exercises on the occasion of the distribution of prizes yesterday afternoon. This occasion was marked by the presence of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Macdonald, Senator and Mrs. Howland, the Superintendent of Education, Councillor Byrne, Edward Roche, Esq., Charles Palmer, Esq., Dr. Conroy, Mrs. Riddin, Mr. and Mrs. D. O'M. Reddin, Mrs. M. Blake, Mrs. P. Blake, Mrs. Connolly, Mr. Angus McDonald of Bedeque, and many others from town and country; and the prizes were distributed by Mrs. Macdonald.

A very pleasing variety was given to the proceedings by musical renditions and the reading of essays by the students. Mr. A. J. McDougald's philosophical paper contained a closely-reasoned and most convincing exposure of the fallacies in the theories of materialists, agnostics and other unbelievers in a great first cause and a governing Providence of the universe; and Mr. Fred Butler's prize essay on the Future of Canada, contained an excellent presentation of the capabilities of our country and a reasonable deduction concerning the great future in store for a Canadian nation adhering to and proceeding in union with the mother country, along the lines of our incomparable constitution.

Judging by these essays, and by the remarks of the Superintendent of Education (who assisted in the practical work of the examination), St. Dunstan's College is doing good work for the rising generation. It is significant and worthy of remark that of eight first-class prizes obtained at Laval University last year, four were won by Prince Edward Islanders who went up from St. Dunstan's College; and that one of the medals awarded at the College of Propaganda in Rome last year, was also won by a Prince Edward Islander from the same institution.

There were in attendance at St. Dunstan's, last year, forty-eight boarders and twenty-six students residing in Charlottetown; and there were eight teachers, two of whom are clergymen.

At the close of the entertainment there was an open competition for Mr. A. B. Warburton's prize of a \$5 gold piece to the best reader. The test was most interesting. There were six competitors. Mr. Terence Campbell was awarded the prize.

After the prizes were distributed, short speeches were delivered by the Rector—Rev. Charles McDonald—by the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. Senator Howland, Charles Palmer, Esq., Mr. Montgomery and Mr. Roche. The Rector conveyed to the students the regret of Bishop McIntyre that he was unavoidably absent on the occasion.

ST. PETER'S SCHOOLS.

A large and interested audience attended the distribution of prizes in St. Peter's Schoolroom last evening. It was pleasing to see among those present the Principals of West Kent and Upper Prince Street Schools. Hon. Mr. Haviland presided and presented the prizes; and Rev. James Simpson, Rev. Fred. E. J. Lloyd, L. W. Watson, Esq., E. J. Hodgson, and the chairman commented favorably upon the work of the pupils. Rev. Mr. Simpson also said a few words to those parents who permit their children to stay away from school without good and sufficient excuse. It was, however, made evident that in spite of all the follies and delinquencies of parents and pupils, good work has been done and substantial progress made in St. Peter's Schools. A very interesting feature of the occasion was Mr. E. J. Hodgson's examination of his General Information Class. The quickness and intelligence displayed by the boys was remarkable, and their familiarity with facts in the current politics of the world, and with history and science might put many men who deem themselves well informed to shame.

The number of visitors at the examination of this school to-day was not large. But we were pleased to notice, among those who were present, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Macdonald, Hon. D. Laird, Professor Anderson, John Ings, Thomas Handrahan, Edward Roche, Isaac Oxenham, and a number of the clergy in connection with St. Dunstan's Cathedral and St. Dunstan's College.

Judging by the manner in which the pupils acquitted themselves, the excellence of this school has been well maintained in the past year. The pupils read and spell well, and seem to be particularly good at figures.

The number of pupils enrolled is 30; the number of teachers 6; the daily average for the year 209, and the percentage of attendance 79.

After the examination there was the usual entertainment in the Upper Hall. Miss Benoit presided at the piano, and Mr. Cullen led the singing, which was good.
